The business at the Police Court for the City of Charlottetown in 1908 was considerably heavier than that of 1907, the number of cases last year being 321, compared with 236 in 1907. Following is the list for 1908: Assaults, convictions, 10; dismissals, 5; Larceny, convictions, 6; dismissals, 2; Forgery, two sent to the Supreme Court; Vagrancy, convictions, 2; dismissals, 4; Prohibition Violation, convictions, 25; dismissals, 30; Drunkenness, convictions, 119; dismissals, 21; Breach of City bye-laws, convictions, 51; dismissals, 22; Perjury, convictions, 1; dismissals, 1; Assault of Police, two convictions; Keeping a Gaming House, two dismissals; Keeping a Disorderly House, one conviction; Running an auto on the streets, one conviction; Neglecting to support family, two dismissals; Breaking and entering dwellings, six dismissals; Breach of Pharmacy Act, one conviction; Giving liquor on election day, two dismissals; Breaking Jail, two sent to Supreme Court; Obtaining money under False pretences, one sent to Supreme Court. In 1907 there were 27 convictions and 30 dismissals of breach of the Prohibition Act. For that year the convictions for drunkenness were 111 and dismissals 13. The total convictions were 173, dismissals 59; sent to Supreme Court, 3. For 1908, the convictions were 219, dismissals 96, sent to Supreme Court, one sent to Supreme Court. Pat. Jan. 6.
