SUSPECT FIRE THE WORK OF PYROMANIAC

Here is a view of all that is left of the principal business section of Port Carling, Muskoka, Ont., following recent disastrous blaze suspected of being caused by a pyromaniac. Loss was estimated at about \$800,000. Thirteen buildings were razed and fire brigades from nearby towns helped combat the spread of the flames. The citizens spent the day and night after the blaze guarding the town against further attempts of the pyromaniac.



JAPANESE AND CHINESE MAY CLASH IN WAR

The Manchurian situation has become very serious and at any moment word may come of the wiping out of an isolated Japanese force, an occurrence that would be likely to precipitate hostilities on a large scale. The Japanese troops on the Nonni River, which demanded the surrender of Taitshar and Angangchi, were hard pressed some days ago and lost 120 men killed and 300 wounded in fighting with the troops of General Ma Chan Shan, representing the Manchurian warlord. General Chang Hsueh Lang, who withdrew the large army under his immediate command to the Great Wall two months ago. The Japanese have set up a puppet of their own as Chinese governor of Manchuria and this poor tool has a General Chang Hai Peng acting for him and using a force of Chinese troops to harass the rear of General Ma's loyal troops. The above map shows the location of Taitshar and Angangchi, south of which, on the Nonni river, a Japanese force has suffered a reverse at the hands of General Ma, representing the loyal Manchurian governor and the Nanking government. Actual warfare may be said to be in progress but Japan and Nanking may choose to regard General Ma's operations as unsanctioned by China proper, thus giving peace makers a chance to intervene. The map shows the location of the South Manchurian and Chinese Eastern railways, the great wall of China and of Peiping and Tientsin, where martial law has been proclaimed. Korea is dominated by Japan and reinforcements can be sent to the hard-pressed Japanese troops on the Manchurian front via Mukden.



SENTENCED TO JAIL

Communism in Canada was given a death blow by Mr. Justice Wright when he sentenced seven Communist leaders to five years each on charges of belonging to an unlawful assembly and to two years for being parties to a seditious conspiracy in Toronto on November 13th.

The men thus sentenced, grimly but casually by the judge, were Tim Buck, Malcolm Bruce, Amos T. Hill, Tom Ewen, John Boychuk, Sam Carr, alias Cohen, and Matthew Popovitch.

The eighth Communist found guilty after seven days of trial before a York county jury, Thomas Cacho, was given two years and one year on similar charges. Deportation will be recommended in the case of those liable to such a penalty.

The sentences in every case were to run concurrently.

Fifteen minutes were sufficient to send the Communists to jail. They were devoid of high lights or histrionics.

Twenty minutes after Mr. Justice Wright sentenced the eight, Hugh John MacDonald, defence counsel, announced he would immediately lodge an appeal against the sentences.
