THE POLITICAL OUTLOOK.

According to telegrams from Ottawa to sundry Conservative journals Mr. Borden has returned from his western tour much encouraged and will fight on to delay the passage of the reciprocity agreement through Parliament, apparently determined to force an election as soon as possible.

The Opposition will not back down and the Government will not give way. "The Opposition will fight to the bitter end," The Standard correspondent says, and Sir Wilfrid Laurier "will go to the country because he cannot force his pact through Parliament."

Political prophecy is proverbially uncertain, but in this case it will be in the power of the Opposition to force a dissolution if they adopt and persist in a policy of obstruction. The Government has no power of closure such as exists in the British Parliament.

After many defeats the temptation is strong for the Opposition leader to play a bold and even reckless game. Committed as he is to wage an unrelenting warfare against reciprocity, it would now be very difficult for him to recede.

On the Government side there is no apparent lack of confidence in the verdict of the country. On the Opposition side there has been a growth of confidence, partly from some accessions of strength immediately after the agreement was announced and partly from Mr. Borden's tour in the Northwest, which, if not altogether encouraging, seems to have been less discouraging than he had expected.
