REFUGEES OF THRACE DEMAND AN AUTONOMOUS STATE

SOFIA, Bulgaria, Oct. 10.—An autonomous state of Thrace, including both Eastern and Western Thrace, under the protection of the League of Nations, has been demanded by a vote of 30,000 refugees of Thrace now in Bulgaria.

Hon. W. S. Fielding Now in London

(Special to The Guardian.) LONDON, Oct. 11.—Hon. W. S. Fielding is now here and anxious to hasten the cattle embargo conference and return to Paris to continue negotiations for the Canadian-French commercial treaty. He declines absolutely to express an opinion for publication on any subject whatever, whether the League of Nations or the British Dominion parliament. His colleagues, however, confirm highest estimates of his work at Geneva, and the great and growing value of his League. Hon. Peter Clarkin, Canadian High Commissioner, says that his one regret is that the United States through whom the League of Nations came into being still remains outside.

Quebec Cabnet Asks for Relief for Burned Vit'ages

(Special to The Guardian.) QUEBEC, Oct. 11.—An order in council was passed this morning at the meeting of the provincial cabinet asking for immediate relief for the inhabitants of the destroyed villages of Nedouche and North Temiskaming. The grant which is estimated at a value of \$25,000 includes 1,000,000 feet of construction timber, 500 rolls of tarpaper, hammers, nails and other supplies for construction purposes.

The subsidy is considered generous and in fact larger than the \$100,000 grant given by Ontario where the area devastated is huge and the loss suffered estimated at millions of dollars. In answer to a request last evening by Premier Taschereau to Hon. MacKenzie King asking for help from the federal government, it was learned this morning that 250 blankets had been placed at the disposal of the Quebec victims with supplies of food.

Steamship Lines Critize Present Immigration Policy

(Special to The Guardian.) OTTAWA, Oct. 11.—Urging that unless drastic measures with regard to opportunities offered by Canada to the immigrant and a return to the former method of a department of Immigration and colonization administered by a separate minister, immigration during the year 1922 would be as disappointing as that of this year, representatives of the Canadian Pacific Steamships Cunard line, White Star Dominion Company and the Anchor Donaldston Steamship Company waited on Hon. Charles Stewart, acting minister of immigration and colonization line today. Transportation interests ask that the government immediately issue a general invitation through the medium of advertising publicity lectures and exhibitions to all desirable immigrants to consider the opportunities offered by Canada for home making.

Passengers Change To Booze Ships

(Special to The Guardian.) LONDON, Oct. 11.—Numerous passengers who were booked to sail on American liners this week are changing to British ships following the announcement of British shipping companies that they intend to defy the Daugherty liquor ruling and test it in the United States courts. European officials of the United States line have been instructed to remove their stocks of liquor before their next trip home.

In accordance with this order the George Washington will sail from Bremen Friday night without a drop of liquor aboard. The President Adams will likewise sail "boozeless" on Sunday.

Can. U. S. Enforce Prohibition Decree On Foreign Ships

(Special to The Guardian.) PARIS, Oct. 11.—The French government flatly denies that it is preparing to protest to Washington against the enforcement of the Daugherty decree. "We think the existing treaties will forbid Washington from enforcing the decree," said one of the highest officials in Quai d'Orsay. "It will be almost two weeks before any French liner can be affected by the decree if it is enforced and how it affects French interests. A French ship is French soil wherever it is and I don't think America will try to enforce American laws on French soil."

Reducing the High Cost of Dying

(Special to The Guardian.) BERLIN, Oct. 11.—The problem of the high cost of dying has been solved in Augsburg, Bavaria, where the public can rent coffins by the hour. The price of coffins has gone up 1,000 per cent and "what use are they to any corpse?" is the Augsburg argument. With the usual pomp the coffin is lowered into the grave, but when the witnesses have gone the coffin is taken out, the corpse clad in a paper shroud and consigned to the earth and the coffin restored to its rightful owner for further use.
