MONCTON WON BY NARROW MARGIN IN PROTESTED GAME

The Abegweits in a Sternly Contested Hockey Battle on Soft Ice Against Moncton "Irregulars" Saturday Night Lost 5 to 4. Decision May Be Reversed.

In a game that was played under protest, on slushy ice, the Moncton aggregation defeated the Abegweits by the close score of 5 to 4.

The game started on time, with the Donnell officiating the Charlottetown team lining up with the utmost confidence, although the ice was in the poorest of condition for a fast game of hockey.

The first period started with the Abegweits taking the offensive, "Surg" Gordon, the old reliable, scoring in five minutes after a brilliant run from one end of the rink to the other, the home team following shortly afterwards with a tally, tying the score for Moncton.

The Abegweits soon jumped into the lead again when Lou Campbell the fast wing man of the "Abs." scored nine minutes afterwards.

There was no more scoring in this period, the Abegweits going for a well earned rest with the score standing in their favor by 2 to 1.

2ND. PERIOD The second session opened with both teams playing good hockey under the circumstances, Moncton finding the net in three minutes and following in twelve minutes later with another goal.

The "Abs." were now finding it hard to carry the puck on heavy ice, and several occasions over-riding it, in this period two of the Abegweits wing men were penalized, thereby putting the team to a great disadvantage.

The period ended with the Monctonians in the lead by a score of 3 to 2.

3RD. PERIOD If the ice was in very poor condition before the game started, it can well be imagined by the followers of the national game, what shape the ice was in, in the last period, The Abegweits got away with a goal, only to lose the puck by over-riding on the poor ice.

The Moncton team managed to land two in the net in the final session, the Abegweits one, the game ending by the score of 5 to 4 in Moncton's favor.

One of the rules of the Maritime Provinces branch of the A. A. U. C. is that any athlete competing with a team must first of all be an amateur, and secondly must be a resident in the town with which he plays for 30 days before the beginning of the League series.

In the game recently played in Charlottetown it was learned after the match that the Moncton team was illegally using a number of players who were stars from towns comprising the New Brunswick Hockey League. These men are not registered with Moncton and are not registered with Moncton.

The matter was taken up with A. W. Covey, President of the M. P. B. A. A. U. C. and it was thought that these "ingers" would be debarred from playing with Moncton on Saturday night. However, Moncton played them despite all authority and regulations.

The following telegrams received by the Abegweits' President speak for themselves:—"ST. JOHN, N. B., Jan. 23.—Have wired manager of your team to play game under protest. Apparently Moncton will do anything to win. Protest will be looked after as far as possible. A. W. Covey, President M. P. A. A. U. C."

The following telegram came from W. S. Hay, Sussex, President of the Eastern Amateur Hockey League:—"Expect to get in touch with Covey tomorrow and find out what action he is taking. Presume it will be necessary to call meeting of executive shortly to take up matter of protest."

If Moncton is allowed to persist in its illegal course it would simply mean the wrecking of amateur sport. Just what action will be taken is doubtful but it seems certain that the game won by them will be awarded to the Abegweits. Draconic action might even lead to their expulsion from the League."

of a crap game Sunday night aboard the Imperator, which docked at noon, nearly two days late, after making the roughest voyage of its career.

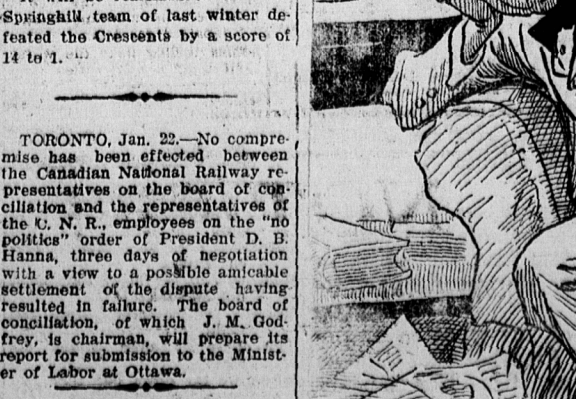
