FUNERAL SERVICES—The funeral of Mrs. Hugh Goodwin, whose death occurred in Malden, Mass., last week, was held yesterday morning from the A. A. COMFORT STATIONS PLANNED—The two comfort stations—one at Tormentine and the other at Borden—to be built by the Canadian National Railways will contain waiting rooms, a refreshment booth with a 13-stool service counter, an office and a store in addition to the ladies' and gentlemen's wash rooms and toilets. Work on the comfort stations has not yet been begun and no information is available as to when their construction will be completed.

POLICE COURT—At the Stipendiary Magistrate's Court yesterday, a person charged with drunken driving was sentenced to seven days in jail, while two persons charged with possession of stolen goods valued under \$25, were each sentenced to three months in jail. Four drunk and incapable appeared, two being fined \$10 and costs or 20 days, one \$5 and costs or 10 days, while the fourth was sentenced to 10 days in jail. Two drunk and disorderly also appeared, one being fined \$20 and costs or 30 days and the other \$5 and costs or 20 days. A party charged with doing transient larceny in the City without a license, pleaded guilty to the charge and was remanded until today.

MONTREAL, April 26, — (CP) — The three biggest "mental flophouses" in America are the radio, movies and pulp magazines. Dr. J. B. Nash, director of New York University's department of physical education and health, told a meeting here. Dr. Nash said that 655,000,000 men-hours a day are spent listening to soap operas which fall to even change "the mentality of a seven-year-old moron." One of every seven persons in the United States went to movies nightly to see pictures which were an insult to the intelligence. "The mechanical age," he said, "has brought us a tremendous amount of leisure, but in spite of all the time-saving devices, there is hardly a person in this audience who is doing as much for some worthy cause as did his mother and grandmother."
