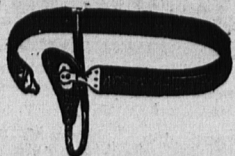

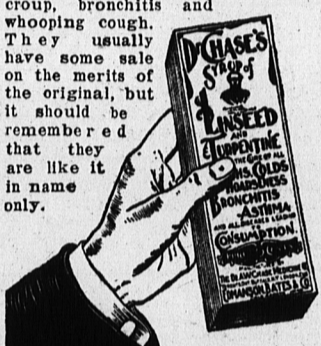
It was announced at this meeting that 250 men are wanted from this Province for the Railway Construction Corps. Men from 18 to 50 years of age are required for this unit. Their work is to be on the construction of railways in France. The same rigid examination is not necessary for men who desire to serve their country in this way. The main essential is that the men are healthy and strong, slight physical defects not barring a man from service. These men receive the same pay as those of other units and the same provision is made to pensions, separation allowance, etc. It is to be hoped that there will be a good response towards this branch of the service.
