Rev E. A. Tonken, Cambay, Ont., occupied the pulpit of the Methodist Church at Union Road, Sunday evening last, preaching with much acceptance from Luke 16. 10. The divinity of service was explained with a felicity of diction and old time eloquence that simply captivated the audience. The musical part of the service was ably carried out under the direction of the organist, Mrs Alfonso Mallett. Full 32 years have passed since Mr. Tonken was stationed at Winsloe, and he referred in feeling terms to the many changes that have taken place on the circuit during that time.

FIRE AT GLACE BAY.

GLACE BAY, Aug. 23.—The operating rooms, condenser room and all the rooms under the roof, were yesterday completely destroyed by fire at the Marconi station. The blaze started in the sparking room, but its discovery was too late to do anything to stop the progress of the fire. The power house was not injured. The dwelling houses, too, are all safe, and so are all the barns and other buildings—except the one that was injured.

THEIR ESCAPE WAS WONDERFUL

Train Falls Forty Feet Through Burning Bridge. No Passengers Seriously Hurt.

VICTORIA, Aug. 23.—(Special)—That the age of miracles has not yet passed is demonstrated by the experience of a Great Northern passenger train from Grand Forks for Spokane. The locomotive, mail-car, baggage, express and passenger coaches with a number of passengers dropped through a burning bridge into a gulch forty feet below, but without killing or fatally injuring anyone, although the train is a total wreck and the financial loss exceeds \$25,000.

BIG FIRE IN BRITISH COLUMBIA.

GRAND FORKS, B. C., Aug. 23.—Slocan Valley is being swept by forest fires, which have burned out the town of Roseberry and are threatening other settlements including the village of Patton. The women have been removed from the valley, and the men are fighting the flames. Every effort is being made by the provincial fire rangers to fight the fire, and all the men available are being pressed into the service. The path of the fire is about a mile wide. Owing to the dryness of the shrubbery the efforts of the firemen are of little avail.

HOG CHOLERA NEAR OTTAWA

OTTAWA, August 22.—Hog cholera or something so like it to justify the government in treating it as hog cholera, has broken out in the neighborhood of Ottawa. Dr J. G. Rutherford, veterinary general and live stock commissioner for the Dominion, is preparing to stamp out the plague at once. Forty four hogs were condemned and killed by the department officials this morning and a rigid quarantine has been established in the neighborhood to which as far as the plague has been restricted. The disease is attributed to the feeding of garbage collected from the hotels and residences of Ottawa and pressure will be brought upon the municipal authorities to establish a garbage incinerator. Dr Rutherford inclines to the opinion that the disease may have been contracted through pieces of uncooked American pork having found its way to the garbage heap.
