A LARGE SCHEME.

Somebody has written to the New York World propounding a scheme, which he thinks "peaceful, lawful and honorable" by which the political union of Canada with the United States may be brought about. His scheme is based upon the cheerful assumption that 50 per cent of the electors in Canada west of Ontario, 50 per cent of Quebec, and a majority in many ridings in Ontario, New Brunswick, Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island, are now in favor of annexation!

Of course, the man is either a fool or an ignoramus, dignified for the moment by having his lucubrations published in a leading New York paper. There is, we doubt not, a much larger proportion of people in the United States who would prefer to be under the sway of King Edward than that of President Roosevelt than there are in Canada who would be willing to change their allegiance in reverse fashion, and still not a very large number.

But to the scheme. It appears to be this: Let 100,000 Americans become citizens of Canada. The World's correspondent points out that these would not have to forswear their allegiance to the United States in becoming naturalized in the Dominion. He would have this army, still resident in the Republic to obtain voting privileges in Canada and by their votes and a spirited political propaganda, bring about the union of two countries.

It is really a great scheme. Not since the famous Captain Bobadil propounded his plan of defeating an army with twenty expert swordsmen, has there been anything like it. Bobadil, it will be remembered, would have his twenty challenge, and of course, kill successive twentys of the enemy until he had "killed them all by computation." That would have been public but somewhat gory process. The later annexation scheme is peaceful and sneaking. How "honorable" it would be to obtain a half citizenship here for the purpose of betraying the Dominion, we can leave our readers to judge for themselves. The great bulk of the American people are too intelligent to be misled by such foolish vagaries and too decent, we trust, to countenance such scoundrelism even were it in the remotest way possible of being carried into effect.

New York City has had 2,567 homicides in ten years of whom only 32 went to the electric chair. The number arraigned for murder in 1896 was 178, and in 1905, 349. While the population increased 28 per cent in the ten years, the homicides increased 95 per cent. Where will this sort of things end?

BATHING FACILITIES.

Much favorable comment was made yesterday upon the announcement made by the Y. M. C. A. Directors of a movement to provide bathing facilities and their generous subscription in that behalf. This has in turn led to much inquiry as to the plan of procedure—whether to proceed by private subscriptions alone, or with subscriptions in aid of a civic grant; where a suitable location can be found and the probable outlay; also how the baths would be managed, who would own, finance and manage the enterprise.

We believe many of our citizens stand ready to aid the project liberally if once a practicable and definite plan is put before them. By all means let a plan be proposed with some estimates of the amount required. We suggest that the Y. M. C. A. Directors might do well to call a public meeting of those interested at which the subject might be thrashed out, and a definite scheme evolved. It is well to "strike the iron while it is hot." The need of baths is felt, and the Charlottetown public have many times proved their willingness to liberally support a good public movement.

Good sidewalks are a notable improvement about the central portion of the city. There are several good things about this form of civic improvement. Once a good walk is laid down in front of premises or buildings that are a little dilapidated the owner is usually moved to set about the work of repairs and renovation. This is a noteworthy feature about all sections where the new and permanent walks have been put down. Another good feature is that once in possession of the better footways the public heartily approves of them and would not for any consideration return to the old order of things.

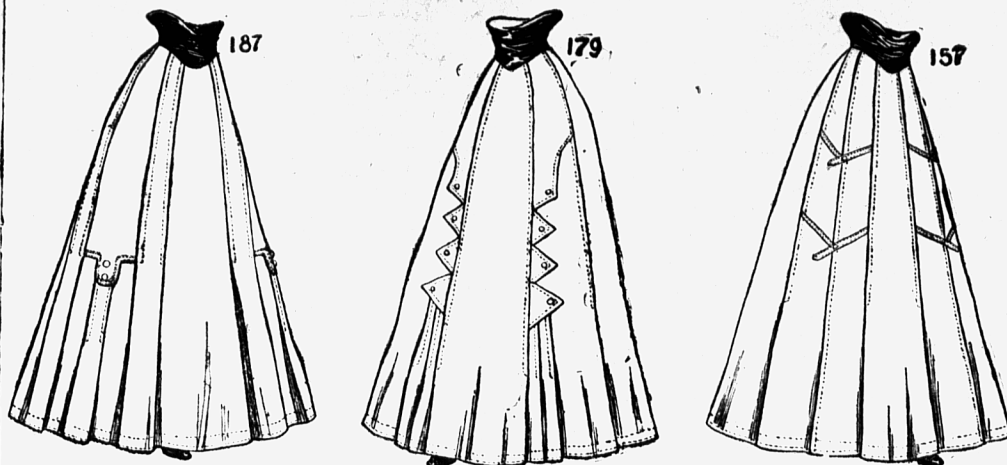

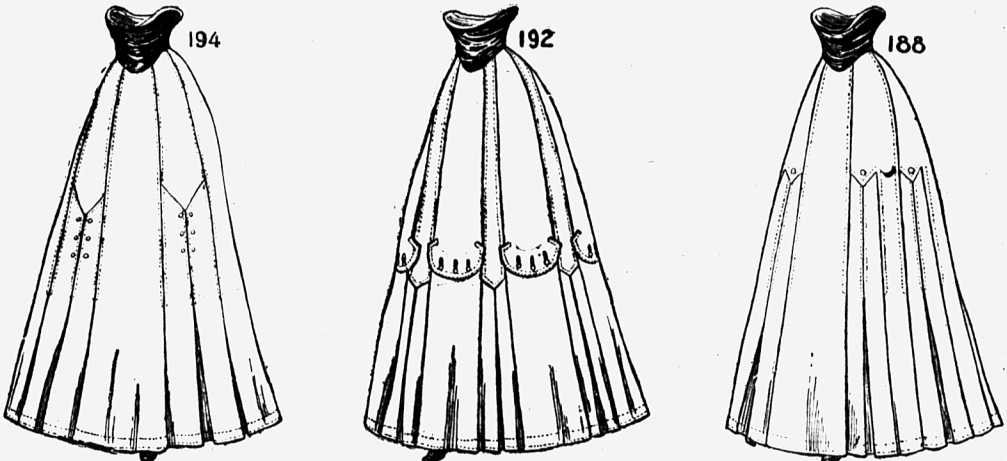
