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CONFERENCE MAY SETTLE DISPUTE

(Special to the Guardian)
MOSCOW, July 27.—The possibility of a conference between Chinese and Soviet officials for the peaceful settlement of the Chinese Eastern Railway dispute in the far east was fore-shadowed by an official dispatch from Vladivostok today declaring it was rumored that the Mukden authorities were inclining toward a solution of the conflict with the Soviet Union through an understanding in spirit of the Soviet note.

TACOMA, Wash., July 28.—Turning over on its right wing 150 feet down the runway, the monoplane City of Tacoma, crashed here today when Lieut. Harold D. Bromley started on his scheduled non-stop flight to Tokyo. Bromley was reported unhurt, but was rushed to Tacoma in a private automobile.

N. Y. Governor Denies Rumors

MONTREAL, July 27.—Franklin D. Roosevelt, governor of New York, denied last night rumors that New York state is likely to step out of the Lawrence waterway scheme. "We are quite in accord with the Canadian plan," he told a Star reporter. "Where trouble could possibly arise is the international stretch of the St. Lawrence. In the stretch of the river where Ontario owns one bank and we own the other we claim also one half of the bed and one half of the power gained from the river."

Air Mail Held Up At Bagdad

LONDON, July 27.—The London Daily Mail today said a terrific sand-storm unprecedented in living memory, had held up the British-India air mail for 20 hours at Bagdad. The blow was continuing. The Mail's dispatch from Bagdad said a sand cloud hovered to a height of 10,000 feet above the terrific rain, destroying visibility and nearly blinding the airmen, who finally abandoned trying to get on.

German Property Held In Dominion Presents Problem

OTTAWA, July 27.—A strong recommendation to the Government's party to the Geneva decision and to the Reparation Commission that German property be returned within one year is contained in the report of the Committee of Experts, headed by Owen D. Young, of the United States, named to draft a plan for the complete and final settlements of the problem of reparations.

Judgment For Plaintiff In Supreme Court

Judgment for \$400 and costs to the plaintiff was rendered on Saturday afternoon by the jury before whom the Supreme Court case of Jones vs. A. Horne & Co. was tried last week. This verdict is inative as final judgment will be given by Mr. Justice Hazzard on Tuesday morning.

Convention To Open August 29

WOLFVILLE, July 27.—The annual United Baptist convention of the Maritime Provinces will be held in University Hall, Wolfville, August 29-September 1, inclusive. The sessions will open on Thursday, August 29, at 9.30 o'clock in the morning. Problems of importance to the denomination will be considered, and it is believed that nearly every church in the Maritimes will be represented.

EXPECT BRIAND TO HEAD GOVT.

PARIS, July 27.—The French cabinet presented their resignation collectively to President Doumergue this morning. Their action followed refusal of Premier Raymond Poincare to reconsider his own decision to resign due to an impending operation. The cabinet's resignation was handed to President Doumergue who presided at the meetings, by Louis Barthou, acting premier, who drafted a letter reading as follows: "The efforts we have made with M. Poincare to persuade him in the interests of his country to retain direction of public affairs, has not met with the result we had hoped."

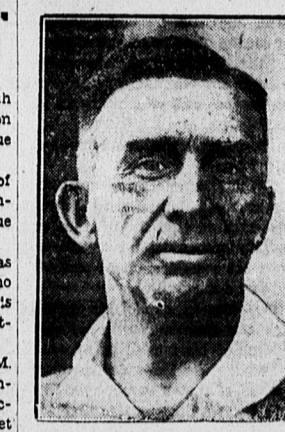
Wheat Price Set At One Dollar

WINNIPEG, July 27.—The initial payment for the 1929 crop has been set at one dollar per bushel. E. B. Ramsay, general manager of the Canadian Wheat Pool announced today. One dollar per bushel has been the initial price paid by the pools since the inception of the Canadian Wheat Pool in 1924 with the exception of last year, when it was lowered to 85 cents per bushel.

QUEBEC, July 27.—Le Soleil, the official organ of the Liberal party in the Province of Quebec, will announce on Monday complete changes in the controlling interests of that newspaper. Confirming a previous story it was learned this evening that transfer of the control of the paper had taken place today, with Hon. Senator Paradis of Quebec, chief organizer, and Senator Donat Raymond of Montreal heading the new syndicate.

A forceful and eloquent sermon, appropriate to the occasion, was preached by Rt. Rev. Francis Kelly, D. D., Bishop of Oklahoma, a native of the Parish.

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Govt. Favors New Treaty with Egypt

CAIRO, Egypt, July 27.—The newspaper El Mokattam says it learns from reliable sources that the British government "views sympathetically a new draft treaty with Egypt." It was said that this would include among other things the following concessions: "The British commissioner to Cairo to become an ambassador; and the Egyptian minister to London to be raised to the rank of ambassador; Recognition of the Sudan debts to Egypt; abolition of foreign capitulations; Britain to relinquish her claim for protection of minorities; Britain to support Egypt with force of arms in case of aggression; and transfer of British forces to the Suez Canal zone."

To Hold Inquiry

VALETTA, Malta, July 27.—The British Admiralty has taken such a serious view of yesterday's disaster the explosion of a gun turret on the cruiser Devonshire, that the dreadnought Queen Elizabeth, with the commander in chief of the Mediterranean fleet aboard, today was steaming at full speed to Volos, Greece, to hold an immediate inquiry. The death of another marine during the night brought the number of fatalities up to sixteen, with nine injured. The loss of the submarine H47 with 23 lives on July 9, quickly followed by an explosion aboard the submarine 11 and the bursting of an air bomb on the cruiser Vindictive which killed one and injured two, together with yesterday's disaster, have made this month the blackest in many years in the British navy.

HENDERSON AND CHURCHILL CLASH IN HOUSE

LONDON, July 27.—Lively clashes between Rt. Hon. Arthur Henderson, foreign secretary, and Rt. Hon. Winston Churchill, former Chancellor of the Exchequer, developed in the House of Commons today when Mr. Henderson made his eagerly awaited statement on the resignation of Lord Lloyd, the High Commissioner in Egypt. Mr. Henderson went back into the record of the Baldwin government and enumerated five instances of a vital divergence of views between Sir Austen Chamberlain, his predecessor in office, and Lord Lloyd. Mr. Henderson also read his letter to Lord Lloyd, which he had described as one "which most people would have accepted as an invitation to terminate his position," and which had led Mr. Churchill to charge the High Commissioner's resignation had been extorted. The salient passage in the letter was "in the light of recent correspondence I should be lacking in frankness if I did not warn you that the possibility of your views being harmonized with those of my predecessor or myself appears to be remote and in these circumstances I should like to discuss the situation with you on your return."

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
