**SAMPSON AND SCHLEY.**

At this distance, and naturally believing as most Americans do, that both Sampson and Schley are brave and capable commanders, it seems strange that a prolonged and bitter controversy should have arisen between them and their partisans as to the share of honor and glory due to each in the victory over and destruction of the Spanish fleet at Santiago. Still more strange does it seem that grave and serious imputations of incompetence and cowardice should be made, even in a so-called history, against Commodore, now Rear Admiral Schley. It is to be hoped that the Court of Admirals, three in number with Dewey at its head, now constituted to try out the issue will be able to sift the matter to the bottom and bring out the true facts of the case.

The criticism of Schley's course begins with the departure of the flying squadron from Key West, May 18, 1898. It was supposed that Admiral Cervera with the Spanish fleet was making for Cienfuegos, and Schley was sent to that port to intercept him. Schley arrived there May 22nd, but immediately after he had sailed from Key West, Sampson was informed that Cervera was at Santiago and sent a despatch to Schley to proceed thither with all possible despatch, but cautiously, if he were satisfied the Spanish fleet was not at Santiago. Schley received this despatch on the 23rd, but says he was not satisfied then that the Spanish fleet was not in Cienfuegos harbor. The next day he sent Commander McCalla into the harbor and found the Spanish fleet had not been there. He started for Santiago after dark May 24th and arrived off that port on May 26th with the flying squadron which was there joined by the ships Yale, Minneapolis and St. Paul.

It is charged against Schley that he delayed too long, and that his trip to Santiago was unnecessarily slow—5 to 8 knots an hour. There are also contradictory reports about the coal supply of the three ships which joined Schley at Santiago. He reported that their coal was reduced and signalled his squadron to proceed to Key West by way of the Yucatan passage for coal. He had in the meantime received an order from Secretary Long to find out definitely whether the Spanish fleet was in Santiago, but cabled back on May 29th that he could not obey as he had to proceed to Key West for coal. This despatch is made the basis for a charge of cowardice and insubordination.

But Schley did not go to Key West. It was found possible to coal the squadron at sea 23 miles west of Santiago, and he returned, taking up a position from four to 12 miles from shore. On the 31st, with the Massachusetts, Iowa and New Orleans he steamed in to a distance of about 8,000 yards from shore and fired at the Cristobal Colon for about seven minutes. He was merely "feeling" the enemy, but this bombardment at long range, followed by retirement is made the basis of a charge of timidity. Sampson arrived June 1st and took command. The blockade was then kept up till July 3 when Cervera sought to save his fleet by a dash for the open sea. It so happened that on that morning Admiral Sampson had gone to Siboney where he had arranged to meet Gen. Shafter. Sampson and his flagship, the New York were 12 miles away when the Spanish fleet came out. In his absence Schley was in command of the fleet and the battle was fought under those conditions, although Sampson and the New York arrived before it was over.

Schley's friends claim for him the credit of the victory. Sampson's friends claim the result was due to the dispositions he had made and the orders given by him in preparation for an attempt by the Spaniards to escape. And they criticise severely Schley's conduct during the battle.

Schley was on board the Brooklyn, one of the fastest American cruisers at that time, but lightly armored. The Infanta Maria Teresa headed toward the Brooklyn during the fight, and Schley, it is alleged, ordered the Brooklyn to be turned in the direction opposite to that taken by the Spanish fleet, thus making a "loop" from left to right while the Spanish ships were turning in the opposite direction. In making this turn the Brooklyn crossed the bows of the Texas, and there seemed danger of a collision. Here Schley is charged with timidity in evading the Infanta, and also with recklessly endangering the Texas. He claims the maneuver saved the Brooklyn from being rammed.

After making the now famous "loop" the Brooklyn joined in the pursuit, but her course was outside of that taken by the other American ships engaged. Admiral Schley claims, however, that his flagship inflicted 38 per cent of the damage sustained by the Spanish fleet and received 52 per cent of the damage inflicted by the Spaniards. The situation has been aggravated by a recently published naval history of the war, written by one McLay, which appears to have pleased about the worst possible construction upon all Schley's actions and conduct during the period covered by the war. Schley and his friends naturally object to such a partisan and unjust account passing into a history which had become of a semi-official character. Hence the appointment of the Court of Admirals referred to in our despatches published yesterday.

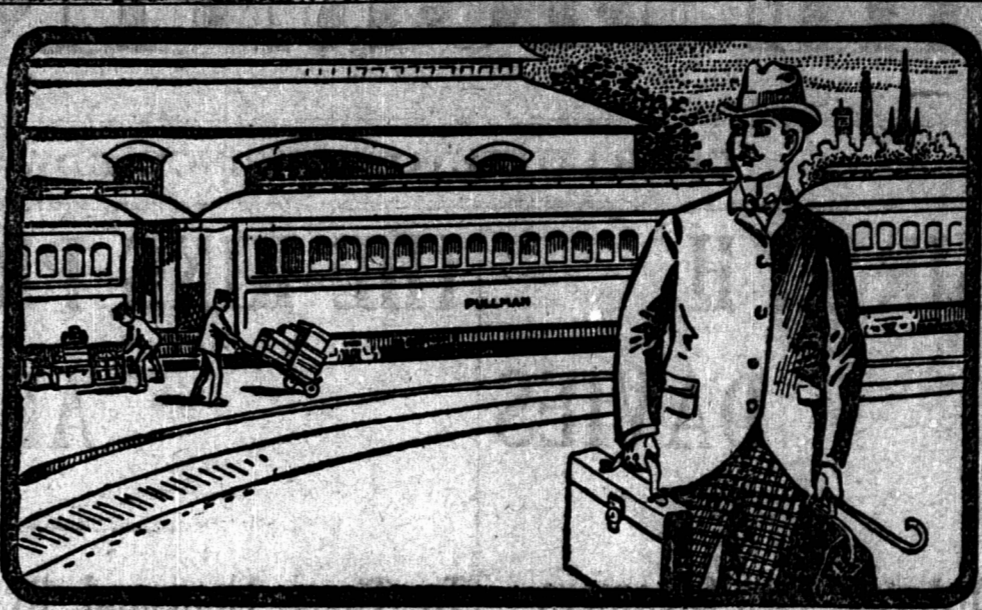
