STANHOPE INSTITUTE.—The June meeting of the Stanhope Women's Institute was held at the home of Mrs. Ray Carr on June 3rd. The meeting opened with the singing of the Institute Ode and roll call was answered with "Why I come to the Institute." Minutes of the previous meeting were read and adopted. The new committees were then appointed as follows: School, Mrs. Isaac Lawson; Mrs. Thomas Horgan; Sick, Mrs. Malcolm McLeod; Mrs. Louis Marshall; Program, Mrs. Ray Carr; Miss Bee Marshall. AGRICULTURISTS WILL TOUR ISLAND.—In connection with the annual convention of the Canadian Society of Technical Agriculturalists, which is, this year, to be held at Wolfville, N. S., between seventy-five and one hundred members of the organization are planning a tour of the Island on June 28, as part of an extended trip through the Maritime Provinces. The convention is to be held on June 23 to 26. On the latter date the party will visit Halifax, will go thence to Truro, and visit the Experimental Farm at Nappan. The party will arrive in Charlottetown on June 27, by the late train, and the following forenoon, will motor through the city. In the afternoon the party will go to Summerside via the North Shore, and next day, Sunday, will cross from Borden to Tormentine. The Car Ferry will make a special trip for the purpose.

ISLAND ARTILLERYMEN.—The 1st Prince Edward Island Medium Brigade Canadian Artillery, under Command of Lieut. Col. P. W. MacNevin, D.C.M., the 2nd Medium Battery commanded by Major D. F. Tierney and the 8th Medium Battery commanded by Major P. S. Fielding, M.M., are being given their finishing touches in gun drill, etc., by B.S.M. Cole, R.C.A., Halifax, prior to being inspected by Brigadier W. W. P. Gibson, C.M.G., D.S.O., O.B.E., Officer Commanding Military District No. 8. The Brigade will then entrain for Petewawa Camp at noon on Saturday, June 21st, arriving there on Monday morning, June 23rd. While at Camp, three days will be given to training, three days to instructional practice and one day to competitive practice, also gun layers tests, signallers qualification, officers and N.C.O.'s questions and other competitive tests will be carried out at this practice camp. The Brigade will leave Petewawa camp at midnight, June 30th, arriving in Montreal at 7 a. m. Tuesday morning; after spending the day in Montreal they will leave for Charlottetown at 7 p. m. arriving at 11 p. m. July 2nd.

All the pupils acquitted themselves most creditably showing careful training by their talented teacher who is to be congratulated on the success of the recital.

During the rendition of the programme little Miss Betty Bruce, on behalf of the pupils presented Miss Hornby with a beautiful bouquet of red and white carnations.

To one who has been attending these recitals marked improvement was noticed, particularly among the junior pupils and it is safe to say that in a very short time Charlottetown will be able to hold its own so far as violinists are concerned.

Master James Hornby in a difficult arrangement of "Believe Me" and Master Charlie Hyndman in his rendition of "Adoration" performed in real professional style, were two numbers much appreciated.

Mr. Albert Blanchard capably presided at the piano for each number and added greatly to the success of the recital.

THE MARKETS (Canadian Press)

MONTREAL, June 11.—Produce—Wheat was dropped 2 cents per bushel today on the Montreal cash grain market. Today's receipts of butter in Montreal included 7,320 boxes of New Zealand butter, which arrived at Halifax recently on the S. S. Port Hobart. This butter and further supplies to arrive shortly will go into cold storage for next winter's use.

Current receipts of Canadian made butter being ample for present demands. Total receipts today were 7,408 boxes. Prices for eastern townships pasteurized creamery today were slightly weaker, freer supplies and a limited demand being credited with the easier feeling. Prices to the retail trade were unchanged. Cheese prices held firm today with receipts at 7,801 boxes. The egg market remained on the quiet side with buying continuing only for immediate needs, very little interest being shown in eggs for storage purposes. Receipts were 1,159 cases. Potatoes were unchanged.

OTTAWA, Ont., June 11.—(Eggs)—Storage holdings of eggs in Canada on the 1st of June, according to the preliminary report of the Dominion Bureau of Statistics were 11,538,753 dozen as compared to 12,291,663 dozen on June 1st, 1929. This includes reports received from 302 firms with ten yet to be heard from. Toronto—Prices on this egg market are generally unchanged, but the undertone is weak. Brokers say it is difficult to make sales of graded country shipments at extras 30 1-2, firsts 28 1-2, seconds 25 1-2 delivered free cases.

Montreal—Egg receipts here yesterday were 1,159 cases as compared to 3,604 cases on the corresponding day last year. Firsts and seconds are accumulating and declining here although extras are holding firm. There are no price changes reported. Chicago spot unchanged, Nov. 27 1-2.
