SANTA CLAUS SHIP SAILS.

BROOKLYN, N. Y., Nov. 10.—The good ship Jason, laden with the Christmas gifts of a million American boys and girls to a million hungry and unhappy boys and girls in the war section of Europe, will steam on her way Tuesday, crossing the wide ocean with her precious burden of good things to lighten the hearts of the suffering. The big ship is loaded from stem to stern and hardly a nook can be seen, for the avalanches of boxes and barrels of gifts filled up all the spare space.

From all parts of America the gifts have come to the Jason, and even far off Honolulu, in Hawaii, sent a big contribution of toys from the boys and girls who live there. The gifts are not all toys and playthings for the boys, but also include food, clothing, and good, warm clothing, as well as goodies for the Christmas dinner occupy a big section of the ship.

The Christmas ship is a big, new American vessel, officered by Americans and manned by Americans. Every one of the men aboard is a blue jacket, and the sailors have given three cheers and vowed that the gifts will reach the children in the stricken land, safe and sound. The ship is 536 feet long and 65 feet wide. She can carry 10,500 tons, and she is tonight loaded nearly to her capacity. For she is taking a big cargo of coal, as well as Christmas gifts, for coal is a very necessary thing for the Jason and the other American vessels who are across the water. The ship cost nearly a million dollars, and is made of steel throughout. Henry T. Merriweather is the name of the commander of the ship.

When the ship sails tomorrow, she will flash her farewell to wireless to the children in America, and will let them know of her progress by means of her powerful wireless equipment when she arrives in Europe. Wireless hands will undertake to distribute the gifts where they are most needed, and on Christmas day a million little ones will be thinking of the boys and girls in America, and how kind they are, and will kneel down and pray that American children will never suffer as they have suffered from the terrors of war and famine.

KAISER'S FARM AGAIN IN HANDS OF RUSSIANS.

LONDON, Nov. 12.—Percival Gibson, the Daily Telegraph correspondent at Petrograd, telegraphs: "Twenty miles from Insterburg, five miles from Goldap and the San, as the crow flies, and less than seventy miles from Posen. That is the position in which the Russian forces stand today.

"Once more Stallpuoenens is in General Rennenkamp's hands and the Cossacks are bivouacking in the royal stables of the Kaiser. There is the Kaiser's famous breeding establishment.

"No private person in Prussia suffers more than the Kaiser from the Russian advance. His great hunting estate at Rominten, with its collection of European deer in the parks, has twice been a battlefield. It has been necessary to cut down all the trees, and the troops have helped themselves liberally to game.

"Roads on the eastern front are deep in snow. Part of the Russian transport already consists of sledges. The Czar's army is adapting itself to a winter campaign in the smallest details. The men are, not suffering from cold.

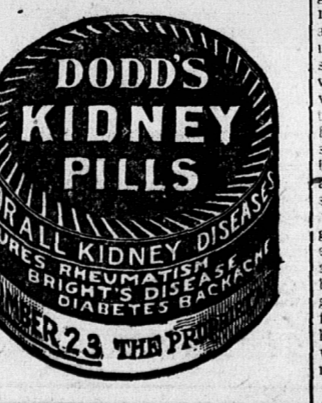
