**HICKS-BEACH WILL SUPPORT BALFOUR**

Sir Michael, Hitherto an Uncompromising Free Trader, Will Help in Carrying Out the Tariff Reform Program Championed by the Premier and Chamberlain.

LONDON, Oct. 28.—The Bristol Times and Mirror says it is authorized to state that Sir Michael Hicks-Beach, formerly chancellor of the exchequer, who represents West Bristol in the house of commons, has decided to support Prime Minister Balfour in carrying out the program outlined by the premier in his recent speech at Sheffield, in which he practically echoed Mr. Chamberlain's protection policy. Sir Michael will appear on the same platform with Mr. Balfour at Bristol on November 11. Sir Michael hitherto has been an uncompromising free trader, and the leader of the free trade unionists.

**SPEECH BY SECRETARY WYNDHAM.**

LONDON, October 28.—Chief Secretary for Ireland Wyndham, speaking at Dover tonight, said that unless England was prepared to lose her prestige she could not afford to see Canada dominated by American capital. With fiscal reform, as proposed by Mr. Chamberlain, said Mr. Wyndham, Canada could become the granary of Great Britain. He strongly urged the linking of Canada directly with the mother country.

Liverpool, October 28.—Joseph Chamberlain former colonial secretary, continued his fiscal campaign in this city today. He delivered two speeches along the line of his former deliverances, using practically no new arguments. Mr. Chamberlain was the guest of the lord mayor of Liverpool at luncheon, and was afterwards presented with an address enclosed in a casket by the Working Men's Conservative Association.

**THE TAX ON MANUFACTURES.**

LONDON, October 28.—In reply to a communication asking Mr. Chamberlain whether it was his intention to tax yarn spun into thread, and leather, Mr. J. A. Corah, a member of a Leicester firm of hosiery manufacturers, has received the following letter, which was published by the Leicester Evening News.

"I am directed by Mr. Chamberlain to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of the 10th inst., and to thank you for your congratulations. Such meetings as that over which you presided are most valuable as a means of education at the present time.

"As regards the letter in the Leicester Daily Post, I am to point out that Mr. Chamberlain has spoken of an average duty of 10 per cent on manufactured goods. In some cases the duty would be higher and some cases lower than the average, and it would be determined in all cases by the amount of labor expended upon them. Thus if there was a tax on boots and shoes, the tax on leather which is partly manufactured, would be much less. It is, however impossible to give details.

"What would happen if Mr. Chamberlain's policy were adopted would be that an expert committee would be appointed to collect evidence from all the manufacturers before fixing the tariff, and to take into consideration, the special circumstances of each trade and the part played in its success by different articles used in the production. This is the scientific spirit in which the Germans work, and which Mr. Chamberlain would desire to imitate. Yours obediently, J. Wilson."
