FRITZ SCHAFER HAS BEEN HIT OVER IN FRANCE

HALIFAX, April 30.—Fitz Schaefer, of Halifax, former amateur 100 yards champion of Canada, has been wounded in the left foot and admitted to hospital at Camiers.

Schaefer flashed into prominence as a sprinter when he defeated Bobby Kerr, the Hamilton flyer, in the Canadian championship at Halifax in 1900 just after Kerr had won the world's championship in the 200-meter sprint in the great Olympic games in London, England.

Schaefer had not been heard of, except locally, up to that time, and his victory was the big surprise of the meet. Frank Stephens, an old time Halifax sprinter was the starter, and undoubtedly Schaefer beat the pistol by a couple of strides, getting a lead over Kerr, he was able to breast the tape a whisker in front of the great Hamilton runner in ten seconds flat. Schaefer did not compete in the 200-yard event, which Kerr won handily. Kerr waited over in Halifax for a few days, hoping to meet Schaefer in another event, and retrieve his laurels, but Schaefer dropped out of training immediately after winning the title, and Kerr did not meet him again.

Schaefer completed in the Canadian championship at Montreal a few years ago, but did not qualify in his heat.

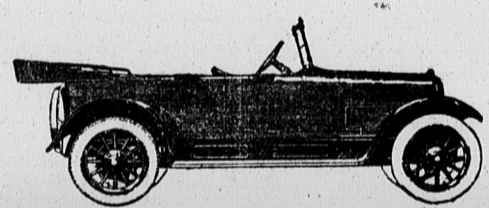
