FALCONS LOSE TO STARS 6-1

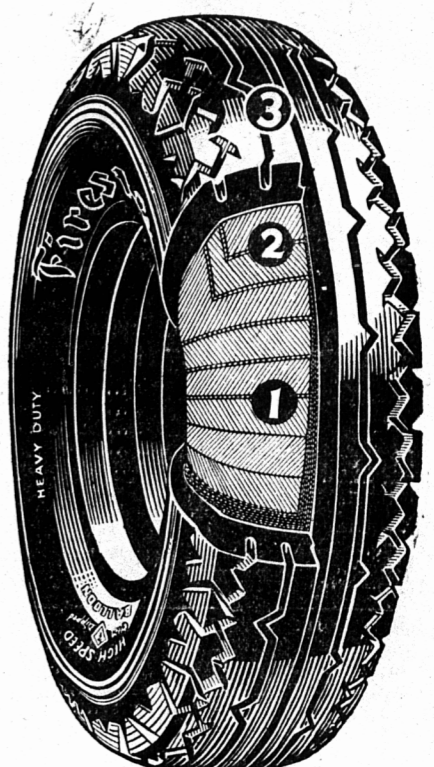

Grain Representatives To Give Counsel

OTTAWA, July 20—(By the Canadian Press)—Opposition to the quota on grain and, as the lesser of two evils, application of a preference tariff that would operate to the advantage of the Canadian wheat grower without unduly injuring British consuming and commercial interests, is the viewpoint of the large group of Britishers who, representing the grain trade in Liverpool and London, are here as observers during the Imperial Conference.

HUGE PROJECT STARTED

Construction of the Galloway hydro-electric project in Scotland has just been started. It will give employment to thousands of men and will cost several million dollars. The points which will be concentrated upon first are Glenlee and Tongland. In order to regulate the level of Loch Ken and to control the flow of water south, a set of sluices are being built across the River Dee at Glenloch Barrage.

SERVICE LINKED

Rail and air transport of parcels and other freight to places abroad has been inaugurated by England's four railways and its commercial aviation company. Packages may be left at any railway station, and are carried by rail to the nearest airport city, where they are transferred to planes. British business concerns seeking new markets are taking advantage of the service.
