**MISSTATEMENT OF SPEECH IN LIBERAL ORGAN**

**Attempt To Extricate Premier Saunders Proves A Difficult Matter**

The local Liberal organ charges the Government with misrepresentation in stating that Premier Saunders' first announcement of a definite arrangement for the presentation of provincial claims before a committee of experts was made in a letter to the Teachers' Federation, and not, as might be expected in the Speech from the Throne or through the press. Neither did Mr. Saunders make any reference to a committee of experts when defending his method of procedure on the floor of the House, the Patriot's statement to the contrary notwithstanding.

The Premier's actual statement, after Mr. Stewart's outline of the procedure to be followed, as taken verbatim in the House:

"When I was in Ottawa this spring, I took the opportunity of conferring with the ministers on public matters. I had a conference with the Premier and the Minister of Finance and they both have stated that I can present our claims in detail before a committee of experts some time in the summer or autumn, and after hearing our claims they will submit a recommendation to the government."

It will be seen that Premier Saunders, in his speech on the Draft Address, while attempting to show that he was following the course indicated by the leader of the Opposition, confined himself to a vaguely general statement which was in sharp contrast to the specific announcement in his letter to the Teachers' Federation. When questioned later in the debate by Dr. MacMillan as to his actual course of procedure, the Premier was silent; and when the same question was placed

**TEACHERS INDIVIDUALLY SOLICITED**

**Premier Saunders Writes To The Teachers Suggesting Appointment Of Committee Educational System.**

The following letter was sent out to the school teachers yesterday by the Premier:

Charlottetown, P. E. I. March 26th, 1929  
 Dear Sir or Madam:  
 In addressing this letter to each individual teacher in the Province, the Government feels that it is doing its duty in explaining the existing situation.

The Government cannot but express its disappointment in the attitude adopted by your body in the matter of increased salaries, and its regret and surprise at the announcement of your recent ultimatum. I would like to point out to you the serious effects of such a strike as you propose, the welfare of the children entrusted to your care being apparently disregarded. You have, moreover, evidently forgotten the duty you owe to your respective districts to the trustees who have engaged you, and to the parents who have entrusted to you the control and guidance of their children.

There seems to be some misunderstanding regarding the time at which my reply was given to the request of your Federation. I naturally made my announcement on the floor of the House and immediately afterwards prepared my letter and sent it to Miss Murnaghan on Thursday evening, 21st, instant.

I believe that in my speech I made it clear that this Government has done all it can reasonably be expected to do. I believe, moreover, that my letter to your Secretary deserved more consideration than to be termed entirely unsatisfactory. I pointed out to your body that our contribution to the Sanatorium this year was all the Government could do, but that on an increase in our subsidy being granted we would give your request the first consideration.

Now, is it such an unreasonable proposition to ask you to wait a few months until we shall have had the opportunity afforded us of obtaining this increase in subsidy? If, as your Federation states, you have waited so many years for an increase, should you, for the sake of a few more months now, endeavor to jeopardize and paralyze the educational system of your Province?

Is this, I ask, unreasonable, when, as stated we have the most confident expectations of being able to obtain an increase in subsidy? Look at it in another light. Our Government sparing no pains and expense has been pressing our claims at Ottawa. No stone will be left unturned in this regard as the coming Conference. If our teachers, therefore, are to receive the first consideration in this connection, can it not be inferred that it is mostly in their interests that we are so exerting ourselves? I believe the teachers should stand by their districts and Province, confident that their Government is exerting its utmost endeavours in their behalf.

**THE ADOPTION ACT**

The Adoption Act provides that a person of full age may apply to a judge for leave to adopt as his child a person younger than himself, unless such other person is married to him or is a brother or sister, an uncle or an aunt.

An adoption order, however, shall not be made in any case where the sole applicant is a male and the infant in respect of whom the application is made is a female unless the court is satisfied that there are special circumstances which justify the making of the order.

The provisions of the act were agreed to, with minor amendments and progress was reported.

"An act for the prevention of venereal disease" received its second reading and was considered in committee of the whole.

This act provides, inter alia, for the examination by the provincial health officer, of persons in custody, or in jail who are suspected of being infected with, or having been exposed to, venereal disease, also providing for the detention and isolation of such persons for treatment.

It also empowers the health officer, or a legally qualified practitioner appointed by him in writing for the purpose to enter any house, outhouse or premises in the day time "for the purpose of making enquiry and examination with respect to the state of any person therein, and may cause any one who is infected with any venereal disease to be removed to a hospital or some proper place."

The Premier in introducing the act stated that the Provincial Health Officer had found incidentally, in the course of his duties since he was appointed, that there was a good deal of venereal disease in the province—particularly in jails and other public institutions and that measures should be taken to combat it. This bill was for the purpose of providing measures to help stamp it out.

1928.  
 Hon. J. P. MacIntyre said he would have the answers prepared as soon as possible.

Mr. MacMillan asked the Hon. Premier the following questions:

1. Was the assistant jailer of Queen's County dismissed by the Government?  
 2. If so, for what reason?  
 3. Was any investigation made by the Government into conditions in the jail and by whom?  
 4. If so what was the result of such investigation?  
 5. Was the assistant jailer a returned soldier?

The Premier said he had not been able to get around to it; he would have the answers tomorrow.

Mr. J. D. Stewart asked the Hon. the Minister of Public Works:

1. What was the total cost for repairs of and extras for all Government Motor Vehicles and machines (including Road Machines) from January 1st, 1928 to March 1st, 1929?  
 2. Are extras for Motor Road Machines now available from the manufacturers? Where have such extras been obtained?  
 3. How much has been paid by the Government to March 1st, 1929 for such labor repairs and extras? How much is still owing and unpaid?  
 4. Give a list of persons to whom paid and the amount paid to each.

Hon. J. P. MacIntyre said that the answers to these were being prepared.

Mr. McLure asked the Premier in the absence of the Minister of Agriculture:

1. Did the Government during the year 1928 expend any public monies in the purchase of seed grain?  
 2. If so, were any of such monies voted or appropriated by the Legislature?  
 3. Have any of such monies been repaid to the Government? If so, how much?  
 4. Give the date of such expenditure, if any.  
 5. Table all correspondence and papers including Government cheque for such purchase.

In the absence of the Minister of Agriculture the Premier replied that he would give the answers as quickly as he possibly could.

The Premier tabled the educational report for the year.

At 4 p. m. the Speaker and members of the House repaired to the Council Chamber, where the Address in reply to the Speech from the Throne was presented to His Honour the Lieutenant Governor.

The Adoption Act received its second reading, and the House went into committee of the whole to consider its provisions.

The bill was introduced by the Premier, who stated that the object of the act, which had really been drafted in Ottawa, and was being introduced in the legislatures of other provinces, so as to provide uniform laws throughout Canada in relation to adoption.

Hon. J. D. Stewart inquired if the act was in force in the other provinces, to which the Premier replied that he could not answer definitely, but he believed it was to be introduced into the legislatures of the other provinces.

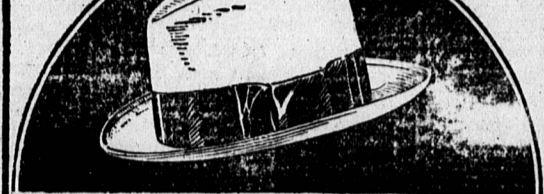
