Hitler's National Socialists have 230 seats in the legislature, by far the strongest party representation. Because of this position of dominance, the Nazi chieftain has been demanding leadership in the government.

Hitler talked things over at luncheon today with Chancellor Von Papen and Defense Minister Kurt Von Schleicher. From a usually authoritative source it was learned the Nazi leader was told it was too late to consider his proposals for participation in the Cabinet. The government surrounded the luncheon meeting with deepest secrecy.

After the luncheon the Chancellor and the Defense Minister, accompanied by Interior Minister Wilhelm Von Gayl and Presidential Secretary Otto Meissner, left for Neudeck in East Prussia, to get President Hindenburg's approval of the Baronial Cabinet's plans for the regeneration of Germany. Thus attention has been effectively diverted to the real source of authority in Germany today—Paul Von Hindenburg.

Many observers saw in the Chancellor's visit to Neudeck a studied gesture of disdain for parliamentarism. The entire German press features the Neudeck confab as of historic moment. There is no doubt that Herr Von Papen enjoys the president's full confidence and the Chancellor will not yield even to a Nazi-Centrist combination unless the President can be shown that such a coalition would set up a presidential and not a party cabinet and that it would offer a concrete programme of action, acceptable to the majority of the Reichstag and at least as good or better than Von Papen's.

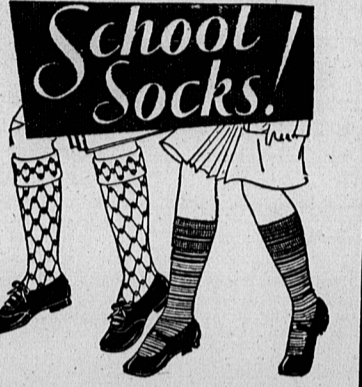
