Germans Controlled Mexican Wireless

WASHINGTON, Dec. 18.—More than 25 wireless stations in Mexico were under German control during the war, Edward Nally, vice-president of the Marconi Wireless Company of America, told the House Merchant Marine Committee today while testifying in opposition to the bill proposing Government monopoly of radio stations in the United States. "The Germans were in full control of the wireless stations in Mexico," said Mr. Nally telling of an investigation made last year of the Mexican Wireless situation by an agent of his Company. "Although the Mexican Government claims title to all the wireless stations," he said "The apparatus is strictly German and there have been German operators in every one of the 25 odd stations. Moreover has sprung up Government electrical shops with German superintendents and the whole system has been supervised by German radio experts who were formerly employed at Stuyville and Tuckerton and on the German liners which were interned in this country at the beginning of the war.

—BAPTIST CONVENTION.—The nineteenth session of the P. E. I. United Baptist Quarterly Convention met with the North River Church, December 10—11. Tuesday evening session was opened by prayer and Scripture reading. Rev. W. E. Piper was appointed acting president. Rev. E. S. Mason then addressed the audience on the subject, "The Rural Problem", giving in his usual forceful manner some valuable information or suggestions regarding the solution of the problem. A well rendered quartette selection was given by the local choir after which Rev. C. R. Freeman delivered an inspiring address on the subject, "Keep the Home Base Strong." Wednesday morning, after the devotional service, the reports of the churches were given, which, in spite of the epidemic, were encouraging. Rev. W. E. Piper was appointed vice-president. A committee consisting of Reverends C. R. Freeman, E. S. Mason, F. A. Hubley and deacon William McLeod was appointed to re-appportion the churches for Denominational Funds. The report of this committee with an increase of \$500.00 was received and adopted. The remainder of the afternoon and evening sessions was given mainly to the induction of Rev. H. R. Bell, pastor of the North River group of churches. The receipts of the quarterly were (\$7.45) less (\$1.97) leaving to the credit of the North River church (\$5.48). A hearty vote of thanks was tendered the entertaining church, the minutes read and approved, bringing to a close a pleasant and profitable convention.

—SOLDIER'S RETURN.—Gunner George Harold McInnis, Charlottetown, arrived home Tuesday after spending over two years in service overseas. He was the youngest of three brothers who left the island to serve their King and Country, two of whom are reported killed, one on the twenty eighth of August, and the other on the eleventh of September. Jos. in August was reported wounded and missing, and later was reported killed. W. F. in September was reported missing; now he is believed killed in action. Harold was wounded the ninth of April in the thigh and back, lost a rib, and went through a number of operations in different hospitals. Harold will not be 20 years old till March.

Australia Asks For Hun Ships

MELBOURNE, Dec. 18.—The British Government will be asked to send to Australia a fleet composed of war vessels and submarines, captured by the Allies. It appears from this despatch that the squadrons would be sent for exhibition purposes. There has heretofore been no hint of Australia wanting the captured vessels for her own navy.

the armistice, is terminating the series of its victories in the very locality where, on the 23rd of August, 1914 it first came into contact with the enemy.

The Third Canadian Division, at the price of enormous sacrifices, entered the city at 3 o'clock this morning, thus avenging, by a signal victory, the retreat of 1914. Glory and gratitude to them!

The Armistice is signed; the German army has capitulated; brutal force is annihilated. Justice and right are triumphant. Belgium emerges greater and fortified from the terrible ordeal through which she has passed. The citizens bore with confidence and courage the sufferings of the occupation. We feel confident that in the hour of triumph, they will observe that dignity and moderation which they have ever shown.

We trust to the good will of all that order may be maintained. We also ask the whole population to resume work as soon as possible. The ruins inflicted by war are enormous and the co-operation and the good will of all our people are necessary

to heal the wounds which it has caused.

In this solemn hour, our infinite gratitude goes out to the Allied armies, and among them, from the depths of our hearts, to our splendid Belgian Army, and its chief our heroic King.
