CARPENTERS HOLD MEETING—A resolution passed recently by the Laborers Protective Union of Charlottetown, asking for the enactment of the Workmen's Compensation Act in this province, was ratified at a meeting of the Carpenters Union last night. The meeting voted to render some financial assistance to the L. P. U. The wage scale for carpenters would be raised from 46 to 56 cents per hour to take effect May 10, it was decided. President of the Union Harold Bernard was chairman.

PROMISES CONSIDERATION—Hon. James P. McIntyre, Minister of Public Works and Highways, in the absence of Premier Thane Campbell, yesterday informed a delegation from Georgetown their request that the town road from Georgetown to Plummer's Corner be at least sub-graded this year preparatory to paving, would be given careful consideration. The delegation included, Rev. J. T. Payne, chairman, Fred Delcor and Dr. J. Llewellyn. The delegates pointed out that Georgetown was the capital of the county, the most important shipping port and possessed unexcelled attractions for tourists.

DIARY RECALLS "PHANTOM SHIP"—Another "phantom ship" yarn. Mrs. Margaret MacLeod Sanders of St. Peter's Bay, a daughter of the late John J. MacLeod, Mr. Buchanan and Belfast, revealed yesterday that in an old diary of her father's is to be seen an entry stating that a "phantom ship" was visible off Wood Island, P. E. I., on the night of March 22, 1912, at nine o'clock. The late Mr. MacLeod saw the ship through marine glasses and described it as "all lit up" and he could see the masts and rigging on the deck. In about 15 minutes it disappeared. The entry further stated that "the ice was gone out of the gulf. The winter boats, Minto and Earl Grey, were running regularly."

PLOTHOLDERS' ANNUAL MEETING—The annual meeting of the Plottolders of Sherwood Cemetery was held yesterday afternoon. The Hon. George D. DeBlois was elected President, and the following the directors: G. H. Black, Henry Smith, Captain T. G. Taylor and Mr. W. E. Bentley. An expression of sympathy was shown to the late Hon. W. S. Stewart, who for several years was the President of the Company, and also an appreciation of his faithful and interested efforts in behalf of the Cemetery. The finances of the Company were shown to be in good condition, and that during the year the sum of \$625.00 was added to the fund for the perpetual care of plots in the cemetery.

Mr. LePage Complains Of Hard Work, Small Pay And Too Much Criticism

Berates Park Landowners, Belittles Courts And Judges, And Flatly Contradicts Mr. McIntyre On Federal Relief Issue.

Claim that the dispossessed landowners in the National Park area still petitioning for right of appeal could get from the Campbell Government "a better settlement than they could get from any Judge or Court in this country" was advanced in the Legislature last night by Hon. B. W. LePage, president of the Executive Council, in speaking on the Budget.

Mr. LePage coupled this invitation with the statement that these people had been "used white" and that if they continued to fight they would be "no better off in the end" and might "possibly be moved" to other parts of the country. In that connection he mentioned his Government colleague Hon. J. P. McIntyre's recent statement that this Province is being "shamefully treated at Ottawa, Mr. LePage insisted that we are getting "our fair share" of relief.

Mr. LePage revealed that he received \$900, plus \$205 travelling expenses, as chairman of the Fishermen's Loan Board in the same period Mr. H. H. Acorn had received \$500 plus \$1285 travelling expenses and Mr. Aeneas Gallant \$300 plus \$387 travelling expenses. He said they were all worth more than they got for their services.

He was followed in the debate by Hon. J. P. McIntyre, Minister of Finance, who stated that the Board of which he is chairman, had shortly before 11 o'clock, after again proving that the Province had been unfairly treated in federal relief allowance. Mr. LePage moved the adjournment of the house adjourned until 3 p.m. today.

Mr. LePage Indignant
He was indignant, Mr. LePage said, at the criticism and "mean insinuations" in the Guardian with reference to the administration expenses of the Fishermen's Loan Board, of which he is chairman. These expenses amounted to about \$5,000. In New Brunswick and Nova Scotia they allow the Board 7 per cent for administration and in this Province they work out to a cost of less than 5 per cent of the \$114,000 expended.

"One of the best places that you will find in this building is the office of the provincial Fishermen's Loan Board office. We get about fifty letters a day and we have a tremendous lot of business to do. I am working in the morning till 5 o'clock in the morning till 5 o'clock at night, and I can do a considerable lot of work but I can hardly keep the thing going. Mr. Acorn does practically all the travelling and he superintends the erection of those buildings in co-operation with the other members of the Board, and he has to do considerable travelling."

Mr. Acorn in two years received \$500, plus \$1285 travelling expenses. He is the "big man" of the Board, Mr. LePage said.

Mr. Gallant received in two years \$300, plus \$387 expenses.

what it used to give when the national highway was being built, but on looking up the Accounts for the last two years I found that we received about \$460,000 from the Dominion Government outside of our subsidy.

"I don't think that anybody can say the Dominion has not used this Province fairly well during the past two years," he said. "Compared with other provinces I think we are getting our share." He understood the Dominion Government as standing projects of their own and we would probably get our share of those as well.

Opening Remarks
Resuming the debate last evening, Mr. LePage first paid tribute to the late Hon. George E. Hughes, Hon. G. S. Inman and Mr. A. J. W. MacMillan, who had preceded the Deputy Speaker (Mr. Wright) upon filling the position "with dignity and honour."

He spoke at some length on his visit to the Old Country during the winter holidays, and at the gatherings he attended and the celebrities he met as representative of the P. E. I. Government, also of his impressions on visiting the battlefields and war cemeteries at Vimy Ridge.

In the British House of Commons, he noted, they were not so given to oratory as in a Canadian Parliament, but they read their speeches for the most part, and that was why there was "less foolishness" in their debates.

He also noted the great number of them known in the British Commons and the expedition and completeness with which every question was answered.

He recalled the institution of federal relief in England as "the real bulwark of Democracy."

LEGISLATURE IN COMMITTEE ON TAX ACTS

Provincial Legislature April 6. The House met at 12:50 p. m. Mr. Acorn presented a petition of the Mayor and Councilors of the town of Souris for an act to amend the Souris Incorporation Act, 1910. A bill in accordance with the petition was received and read.

After recess: The House met at 3:25 p. m. with Deputy Speaker Horace Wright in the chair. Hon. Mr. McIntyre tabled the report of the Department of Public Works and Highways. On motion of the Premier the House resumed committee, with Mr. Stewart in the chair, on the Income Tax Act.

The bill, in accordance with Dominion regulations, provides for payment of income taxes on April 30 of each year or by monthly instalments extending over a period of four months and bearing interest at 4 per cent.

The Premier moved, as an amendment, the proviso that in respect of the 1937 taxation period only, a taxpayer may by notice to the Commissioner of Income Tax filed with his returns, defer the date of payment until Oct. 31, 1938, without incurring interest charges on the amount so deferred.

The incidence of the tax burden and the clauses dealing with offenses and penalties were discussed at some length. There will be an additional burden on those who have not been disclosing the whole of their income during the past fourteen years, Premier Campbell conceded in reply to questions.

The bill was reported agreed to with amendment.
