ROCKEFELLER ON GIVING.

The multi-millionaire Rockefeller of Standard Oil fame is also a Sunday school teacher and recently gave his class some gratuitous advice about the philosophy of giving. He said nothing about the story of the widow's mite and its attendant contrast, but laid it down that a chief duty in giving is to make others give and the way to do this is by giving conditionally. This is the plan he has observed in his library donations, and in the course of his remarks he implied a kind of malicious delight in forcing donations from men who dislike to make them.

It is pointed out that in now taking this ground he is inconsistent with his own earlier practice, for his very biggest donations, to Chicago University, for instance were given unconditionally. Moreover while this system of conditional giving has swelled the total of gifts for public uses it may be held to have placed much of the so called generosity upon a plain certainly below the highest. In bestowing gifts for charitable or other necessary uses it is the duty of each to give willingly—not grudgingly or with a sinister motive—and according to the ability of the giver. Doubtless the money however given may be useful, but if the object in giving be partly to extort money from others, or to obtain any object than to serve the particular charity in view, then the virtue of giving is shorn of its grace and beauty.

Mr. Rockefeller told his class that while not many of them could probably become very rich they could lay the foundations of character, "which is better than all the gold and all the ships and all the railroads." He appears not to have included Standard Oil stock among the possessions which would weigh light in the scale of anist character, nor did he discuss the morality of those trusts and monopolies which enable men to extract millions from the pocket of their fellow citizens, a portion of it to be afterward given away in so-called princely beneficence. The trouble is that too many both in and outside of his Bible class may be so dazzled with the Rockefeller success that they follow too closely some of the doubtful methods by which great wealth is most readily accumulated.

It is now an established fact that there is a fatal contagion in consumption dangerous to those who are brought in contact with patients unless great care is taken, and dangerous to those who occupy the same rooms unless said rooms are carefully fumigated and disinfected. In the Province of Quebec every householder in whose house a death from tuberculosis of the lungs occurs is required by law to notify the Secretary of the local Board of Health within forty-eight hours of such occurrence. Immediately upon such notification being given the municipality must cause the disinfection of the apartments occupied by the deceased. This law came into effect on June 7, 1900. It is high time that the Eastern Province of Canada took decided action for greater public security in this matter.

A writer in one of the St. John papers throws doubt upon the enforcement of anti-spitting-by-law in that city. It appears that the corner loafers have found it impracticable to continue their loitering business without decorating the sidewalks at the same time after the manner to which they had been accustomed. The proper corner loafer is of the same stripe all over the world. The campaign against the spitting nuisance meanwhile goes on in England and the United States. In San Francisco a wealthy citizen was recently convicted of defiling the walk, and although he carried the case from court to court was eventually compelled to suffer a day's imprisonment.
