

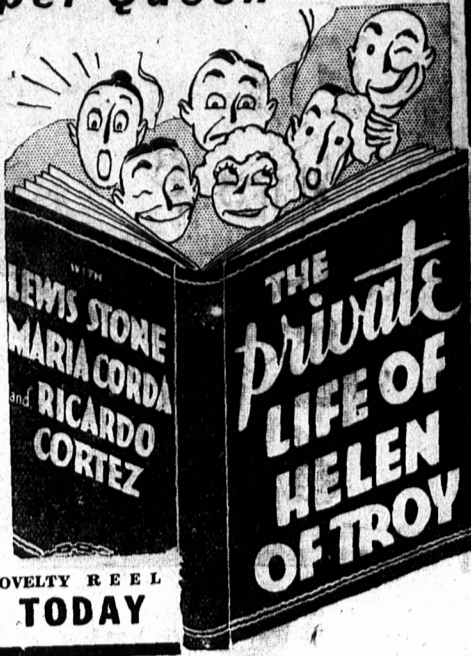

Annual Report Of Rotary Club

At the meeting of the Rotary Club on Monday, the following report of the year's activities was presented by the retiring President, Dr. W. J. MacMillan:

The Rotary Club of Charlottetown has had a relatively successful year and I am pleased to report a sustained interest and activity along the lines indicated in our Constitution.

The usual grant to the Free Dispensary at Christmas, and defraying the expenses of a number of boys for a summer camp marked the club's interest in community welfare and individual contributions to the Adult Blind drive, the Navy League and the Canadian Branch of the League of Nations indicated the willingness of club members to assist in advancing the interests of every worthy object.

On numerous occasions we assisted in making visitors to our city and province feel at home, notably on the occasion of the visit of the delegates of the World's Congress, when our club undertook for a day, and more recently when the C. M. A. held the most successful meeting in its history in this city.

At the Confederation Celebration held in Ottawa last summer, our province was represented in a Rotary way by Frederick Boulter, son of Wilfred Boulter, and the older boys from every province in Canada received an insight into Rotary through the medium of meeting together on such a momentous occasion.

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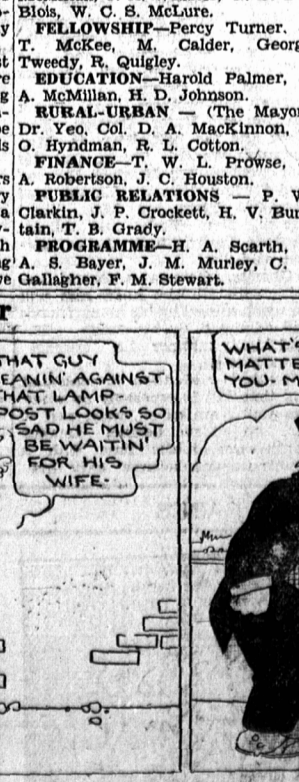
