The scenes that we have had to witness in our nation's parliament during the past four years would make the very angels weep, but what is even more disconcerting is the lack of apprehension amongst ourselves of the disasters that immediately confront us.

A few days since I tried in these columns to arouse an interest in the more than serious magnetic power that threatens, within the next few years, to draw great numbers of our people into the maw of the almighty dollar nation that skirts our Southern border, and the only response that it has evoked has been a shrug and an apparent willingness to succumb to the so-called "inevitable." Is it that the memory of the spirit of Macdonald and Cartier, of Tupper and Tilley, of Strathcona, Mount Stephen and Angus, of Van Horne and Shaughnessy and of Mowat and Laurier, has in so short a time faded away and left us as a people supine, and unworthy of the heritage these men of vision bestowed upon us, or is it that for a nonce we are unable to see even a silver lining that may be lurking beneath the black clouds that now hide the Heavens from our view?

Such a spectacle as the man who for the past four years has posed as the leader of a great people has asked us to witness during the six weeks of the present electoral campaign should call forth the wrath and indignation of every man and woman upon whom the duties of the franchise have been imposed. Stalking up and down the country, by the Atlantic and the Pacific, on the Prairies and in our cities and towns, beseeching the people to give him greater strength to continue his misrule, professing one belief here and directly the opposite there, and offering national bribes in exchange for votes that in private life would call for the severest sentence of a court of justice, William Lyon Mackenzie King stands condemned before Heaven as a man whose bond is preferred to his word, one who, while declaring for unity of feeling, has done nought since he entered public life but sow seeds of discord that have matured and multiplied in all sections of our country.

The twenty-ninth of this month of October will be a testing day indeed for our nation, for then will the people tell the world and one another whether they are the prey to blind political fanaticism, or whether they have decided to free themselves forever from any and every man or set of men who place their own aggrandisement before the overwhelming needs of the country they are chosen to serve.
