by the anti-unionists and three by the United Church and three more to be appointed by these six. So it is in the Dominion Act. But in Ontario and in Quebec the anti-union forces, as the price of getting our Bills through at all, compelled the concession by those Provincial Parliaments before-hand of Knox College property in Toronto and of the Presbyterian College property in Montreal and its charter, to the non-concurring congregations.

When the Dominion Act had gone through at Ottawa and our tired little group of United Church workers were preparing to come home, one of the oldest and most experienced members of Parliament called one of our number into his room and said, "Before you men go home I want to tell you that you have had one of the hardest fights I have ever known in Ottawa and you have put up the best fight in all my Parliamentary experience. You have kept your heads and been kindly through it all—my lobby has been purely informative. When you came to Ottawa I would have said the House was two to one against you—and you have carried it through by two to one for you." It was a satisfaction then to know we had won fairly and it is a joy looking back over it all to be able to assure the United Church that its Committee on Law have done its work with only one aim, to do fairly by all concerned, that it has all ways done fairly and more. Our United Church of Canada rests on clean foundations.

Two Bunbury Cow Leaders

During the month of April, 107 certificates were issued for Holstein-Friesian cows and heifers qualifying in the Record of Performance. In this report are shown sixteen cows with over 800 lbs. butter and twelve with over 20,000 lbs. milk. Elizabeth St. John, Charlottetown, P.E.I., with 1185 lbs. butter and 23,562 lbs. milk; Jean Abbecker Pontiac (W. R. Boyver, Charlottetown, P.E.I.) being a very close second with 1185 lbs. butter and 23,350 lbs. milk (official report.) The cow's two cows live at Bunbury and their stable houses are not 600 yards apart. The records are virtually a tie. Both cows gave milk testing over 4 per cent. In some respects, the record made by Wilfred Boyver is the more remarkable. He had never run a cow on test before, while Joe Bradley, herdsman at Bunbury Farm, is an experienced hand, and last year made a world's record. But Joe's cow—Elizabeth—took a trip to Toronto last Fall and was travelling 30 days which Joe claims cost him a cow's record over 50 lbs. butter. Elizabeth is seven and Jean is six. Anyway, they are both great cows and have made the third and fourth highest records ever made by any cow of any breed in the Maritimes.

encouragement for breeding such cattle is a legitimate enterprise for the Board of Trade.
There is a serious handicap in making such tests on P.E.I. The dealers in Charlottetown and Summerside do not import enough kinds of feeds and they have to charge exorbitant prices. While any Ontario stable can get its best pulp meal at from \$33 to \$35 a ton, Charlottetown merchants, when they occasionally have it, charge \$53, even though the base price is \$29. Gluten feed, hominy, brewers' grains, are never kept in stock. To make matters no better, the government steamers will not give a \$5 a ton rate from Montreal, unless a carload is ordered. Feeds should be purchased on the same basis as fertilizer, by a co-operative association, or the Dairy Association.
