ANOTHER TO THE ISLAND'S ROLL.—To the list of brave islanders who have joined the patriotic band that will be sent as Canada's first contribution to the Continental war, is to be added G. H. Munroe, of this city. He enlisted at St. John, N. B., as a gunner of the Third Regiment of Artillery stationed there, and he left on Friday night last for Valcartier with the detachment of 253 which this regiment has furnished for the Canadian Contingent.

The very sad death occurred at his home at Garfield on Sunday, 23rd inst., of Alexander C. McKenzie at the early age of thirty-eight. Deceased had been in ill-health for the past seventeen months, having spent a part of that time at Saranac Lake, N. Y. The late Mr. McKenzie was a general favorite and his kind disposition and pleasant manner won for him the love and respect of a great many friends. He bore his illness with great patience and was exceptionally cheerful to the end. The funeral which was largely attended, took place on Tuesday, the 28th inst., at St. John's cemetery. The service was conducted at the house and grave by Rev. D. McKenzie. The pall-bearers were:—Messrs. A. J. McKenzie, Benj. Balderson, John A. McKenzie, M. Brock, Gilmore, Daniel Faulkner and J. M. McKenzie. Besides a large circle of friends and relatives he leaves to mourn a loving mother, two sisters, Mary and Annie, and one brother, Donald, all at home.

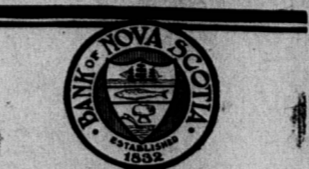
