**DORANDO TO MEET LJUNGSTROM HERE.**

BOSTON, April 10—Another attempt to interest the lovers of long-distance running of this section in professional contests between men of world-wide repute will be made next

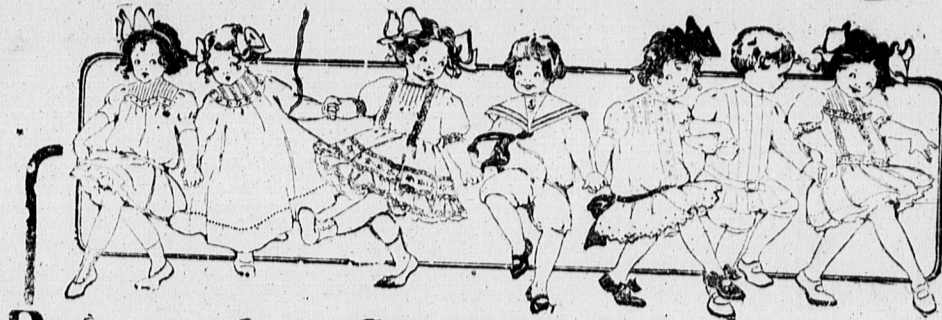
Saturday night, when Gusta Ljungstrom and Dorando Petri are to meet in a 20-mile race at the American league grounds, Huntington avenue.  
 Ljungstrom is a Swede and a week ago made a new world's record of 21.34m. 8s. for the British Marathon distance, 26 miles 355 yards, at the Polo baseball grounds, New York. He has not been beaten since he arrived. At the Madison Square Garden a month ago he ran rings around one of the fastest fields of professional runners of the country in a 20-mile race.  
 It will be the first appearance of Dorando in this city. He is remembered more for his wonderful race at the British Olympic championships, when he was carried across the finish-

ing line by the British officials, and for afterwards proving himself to be the master of Johnny Hayes, who won the Olympic event.

**RATE CUTTING DIVERTS CANADIAN GRAIN TO AMERICAN PORTS.**

MONTREAL, April 10.—Montreal shipping men view with disquietude the diversion of Canadian grain to American routes following the recent cutting of rates. Already 2,000,000 bushels of Canadian grain have been routed by American lines from Buffalo and while a portion of this would have gone via American lines in any event, the main movement is due to a cut in rates on the other side.
