The first lot is made up of salmon and halibut, from the Pacific coast, and cod, soles, smoked haddock, and filets, from the Maritime Provinces.

MONTREAL, February 8.—In the admiralty court this morning, in the case of the C. P. R., against the owners of the steamer Storstad, arising out of the sinking of the liner Empress of Ireland, a motion was made before Justice Dunlop to have W. Simpson Walker, K.C. assess the damages awarded. The motion was left in abeyance.

NO COAL FOR NORWEGIAN STEAMER.

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., February 8.—The British admiralty has refused permission to the Norwegian steamer, Orontoda, now at this port, to take on sufficient coal to enable her to proceed on her voyage from Copenhagen for Baltimore.
