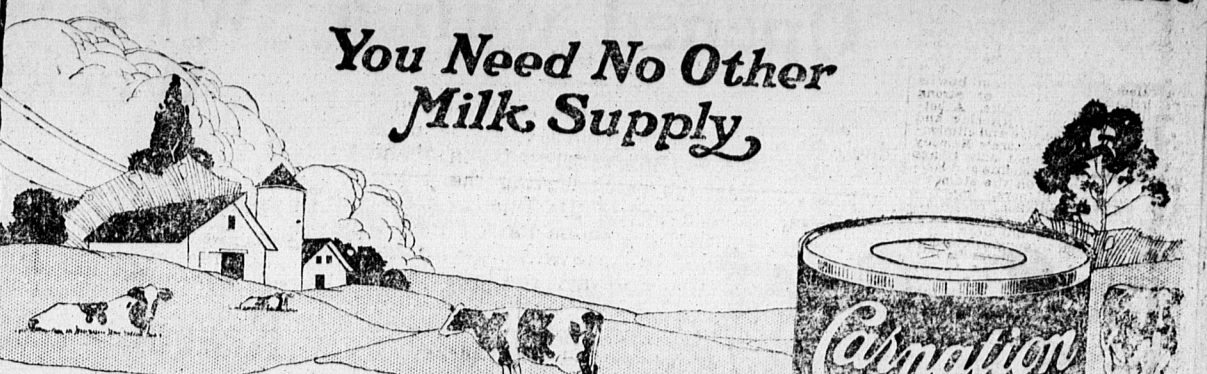

JOHN CRAIG GILLESPIE
A prominent figure in the life and community of Clyde River has passed away in the person of John Craig Gillespie, who died at his residence there on Nov. 3, 1920, at the ripe old age of 89.
