DR. R. B. SHAW'S DEATH.

With deep regret The Guardian announces the death of Dr. R. Bruce Shaw of this city which took place in the Massachusetts General Hospital on Sunday evening last.

On Monday, August 31, while in Boston he had been taken ill with appendicitis symptoms of which had previously manifested themselves. He was taken to the hospital, and after consultation was immediately operated upon that evening. The latter part of the week he grew weaker. Saturday night a telegram announced that he was very low and yesterday morning another message told of his demise.

The remains accompanied by the deceased's brothers Wallace and William who were present at the time of his death will arrive Wednesday night and the funeral will probably take place on Friday afternoon.

Dr. Shaw was one of Charlottetown's most popular physicians; his kindness to the needy and his ever tender care to those to whom he was called to minister won him hundreds of warm friends to whom death comes as a sudden blow.

The deceased was a son of William Shaw, Covehead. After graduating with honors at P.W. College he taught in Flat River and West Keat school. At McGill his course was a brilliant one and after two years in the Royal Victoria Hospital he began practice in this city in 1898 where he has been universally esteemed.

Now he is stricken down as he is entering upon the prime of manhood—at the age of thirty five—with bright promise of a useful and successful life. To the bereaved widow, to the sorrowing father, mother and brothers, and the other relatives the heartfelt sympathy of the community will be extended in this hour of their sorrow and affliction.

Have Just Added to Their Plant

A Leonard Corliss Engine—The First in the Lower Provinces—An Up-to-Date System.

There are few towns of its size, if any, in Canada which can boast of such a lighting system as that which Summerside has. The Summerside Electric Company have from the time of their incorporation endeavored to give their patrons satisfaction; and where a high price may be considered to be paid for lighting service it is due not to any controlling powers of the company, but to the conditions which accompany a good and satisfactory service.

The Summerside Electric Co. when it first started began on a small scale and have ever since been adding to their plant that machinery which ensures utility and satisfaction until to-day we have, through their enterprise, electrical power enough to supply the greatest wants of the people, with some to spare.

The Company have just installed a large new engine which is certainly a source of pride not alone to themselves but to all citizens. The engine is a Leonard Corliss of from 200 to 225 horse power capacity, manufactured by E. Leonard & Sons, London, Ont. George H. Evans and J. W. Irwin, representing this firm in the Maritime Provinces, have been here during the past week or so installing the engine; and a great many citizens have been viewing it and commenting upon its easy and steady motion.

The former engines which this one displaced were of the high speed variety which necessarily caused some vibration due to the use of that type of engine, but which is entirely overcome by the present style of machine, it making only 88 revolutions per minute.

The four valves on this engine permit of perfect steam distribution, ensuring the very highest economy, as evidenced by the indicator cards taken by Mr. Evans.

The complete absence of vibration is greatly appreciated by the neighbors.

This is the first Leonard Corliss installed in the Lower Provinces, although many have been placed in the west. The fly wheel is 12 feet in diameter, and the engine complete weighs about 30,000 pounds.

The feed water heater and purifier introduced is also of a very superior type, heating the feed water from a temperature of about 45 degrees to 210 degrees, passing into the boiler at the latter temperature.

This engine with the Canada General Generator is capable of running 2,500 lights 16 p. In addition the Company have practically a duplicate steam plant and generator standing in reserve capable of handling a large proportion of the load carried by the running plant in case of accident. They have also two Eider Circuit Breakers which are placed for the protection of their generators and the town in general. These circuit breakers are set at a voltage of 120; and any excess over this amount will throw the breakers open, thus cutting off all current supply from going outside the station and removing all element of danger to life and property.

A trip through this station revealed the fact that every up-to-date appliance has been installed here, the Company evidently being determined to give their patrons every possible satisfaction.
