Named Director Of Carnegie Institute Women's College

PITTSBURGH, Pa., June 18.—Miss Edith M. Winchester, a native of Charlottetown, Prince Edward Island, has been named director of Margaret Morrison Carnegie College, women's college of Carnegie Institute of Technology, Pittsburgh, Pa., effective July 1, according to an announcement by Dr. Robert E. Doherty, president of the institution.

Miss Winchester, who will retain her duties as head of the Department of Secretarial Studies, will succeed Dr. Charles Watkins, retiring director of the College, who will go on leave of absence July 1.

The new head of Margaret Morrison joined the Carnegie faculty in 1919 as instructor in secretarial studies; became acting head of the department in 1926 and head in 1929. She has been a full professor since 1939. She received a bachelor of science degree from Simmons College, Boston, and in 1932 earned the degree of master of education from Harvard University.

Ms. Winchester served as secretary of the general faculty for a number of years and as chairman in 1938-39. Since 1944 she has been secretary of the Margaret Morrison faculty. She is a charter member of the Carnegie chapter of Phi Kappa Phi, national scholastic honorary; a member of the National Education Association; the Eastern Commercial Teachers Association; and the National Association of Business Teacher-Training Institutions. In 1938 she was president of the Tri-State Commercial Education Association, an organization in which she has taken an active part.

Ms. Winchester is in the Maritimes from June 17 to June 23 and J. Edgar March, assistant manager of the department of public relations.

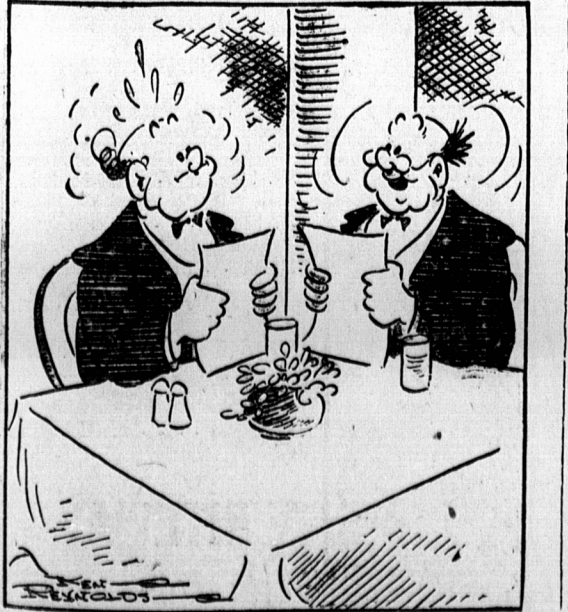

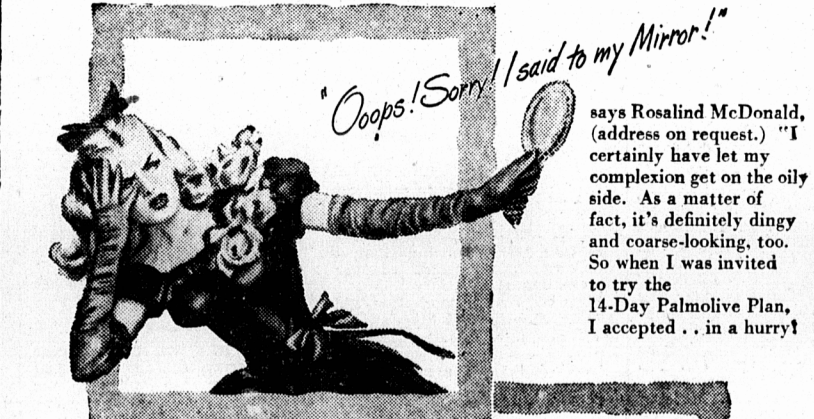
