**FRANCE WILL NOT INFLATE SAYS BONNET**

(Associated Press)  
PARIS, Oct. 1.—Minister of Finance Georges Bonnet, in a speech today at Perigueux gave France the first official statement that the Government has turned its back on inflation.

"Categorical hostility to any inflation is the dominating sentiment of public opinion," he declared. "The Government knows its duty and will not fail."

The Finance Minister said the Government was preparing to attack the problems of its unbalanced budget and the cost of living, pointing out that the French people were insistent upon protection of the franc.

**New Import Quotas**  
The Minister of Commerce, reaching for fresh markets as an aid to deflation, today issued new import quotas for October. The quotas were set for one month only instead of the customary three months period, the Government evidently postponing action on the recent decision to use the quotas as means of bargaining for trade concessions.

The Minister of Agriculture, however, began to put into effect reductions on foodstuff imports for the last quarter of the year. These measures, which drastically reduce quotas on fruit, meat, grain and butter, were announced Thursday.

**IRON DUKES ELIMINATE WESTVILLE NINE**

WESTVILLE, N. S., Oct. 1.—Springhill Iron Dukes defeated Westville's intermediate nine by a 2-1 score Saturday and gained the right to enter the Nova Scotia baseball finals. They will play off with Halifax Socials, the winners to meet Summerside Pioneers for the Maritime title.

Darroch of Westville and Spence of Springhill struck a pitcher's battle Saturday, staking out ten men apiece. Spence gave five hits, the opposing moundman allowed one more.

Springhill gained their two runs in the sixth. An error and two base hits combined to allow Nollies and Beaton score the plate. In the fourth, White reached first on an error; advanced on a sacrifice and went home on a hit.

**GOLF TEAM WINS TROPHY**

MONTREAL, Oct. 1.—Paced by the brilliant Francis Outmet and Jesse Guilford, each a former amateur champion of the United States, the Massachusetts Golf Association today had won the 1933 Lesley Cup competition from golfers of New York Metropolitan Association, Quebec and Pennsylvania.

Massachusetts won back the honors they held in 1931 but lost to Pennsylvania in 1932 by scoring 52 points in two days play of Scotch foursomes and singles ending last night at the Royal Montreal Golf Club here. New York took second place with 47 points, Quebec, leader at the half way mark, slipped into third place with 46 1-2 points and Pennsylvania was a poor fourth with 34 1-2.
