THE MARKETS

MONTREAL, Jan. 21.—The market was without any new feature to note today, except that receipts were much larger than they have been of late owing to the fact that dealers in some cases are now importing stock from the resources to meet their requirements on account of the small supplies of Canadian cold storage eggs now being available. There is a good steady consumption demand, and a fairly active trade is reported in a jobbing way at firm prices. The receipts today were 25.8 cases, as against 23.3 for the same day last week, and 93.4 for the corresponding day a year ago.

We quote wholesale jobbing prices as follows: New laid eggs..... 85c to 90c; Fresh eggs..... 90c to 95c; Selected C.S. eggs..... 90c to 95c; No. 1 C.S. eggs..... 90c to 95c; No. 2 C.S. eggs..... 85c to 90c.

There was an increased demand from butchers and other dealers for dressed poultry today, and this, coupled with the steady buying going on for storage account, created a better feeling in the market, and a more active trade was done, but as supplies seemed ample to satisfy all wants there was no actual change in prices to note.

We quote wholesale jobbing prices as follows: Turkeys, choice..... 52c to 53c; Good turkeys..... 50c to 51c; Geese..... 39c to 35c; Chickens..... 38c to 35c; Ducks..... 35c to 32c; Fowls..... 25c to 32c.

The market for potatoes was steady today at the recent decline noted. On account of the colder weather prevailing of late, the receipts have decreased and the demand has improved some for car lots, therefore trade was rather more active, with sales of car lots of Green Mountains at \$1.55 to \$1.60 Quebec stock at \$1.45 to \$1.50 per bag of 90 lbs. ex-track, while in a wholesale jobbing way they sold at \$1.75 to \$1.80 per bag of 80 lbs. ex-store.

New York, January 21.—Eggs weak. Receipts 12,449 cases. Fresh gathered, extra firsts, 75c to 77c; fresh gathered, firsts, 73c to 75c; State, Pennsylvania and nearby western hennery, whites, firsts to extras, 77c to 82c; do. browns, extras, 79c to 80c; do. gathered, browns and mixed colors, firsts to extras, 75c to 78c; refrigerator firsts, 61c to 65c.

Chicago, January 21.—Eggs lower. Receipts 4,578 cases. At mark cases included, 61c to 65c.
