BUDGET OF NEWS FROM AUSTRALIA

MELBOURNE, Feb. 24—The Federal Government has gone still further in its campaign against Asiatics in Australia. Regulations have been issued which have the effect of practically expelling the Orientals in the pearl fisheries on the west coast of Australia. Although the trade is worth to the Commonwealth about one hundred thousand pounds sterling, the Government has made a scruple in carrying out its policy. Ostensibly the reason for the Ministry's action is that the "White Australia" policy permits no inferences to be drawn as caused by the presence of the pearlers on the coasts, but the real reason is that the authorities charged with the duty of securing the defence of the Island Continent are anxious lest the Japanese be given the opportunity of spying out the land.

The Government of the State of Victoria proposes to introduce a charities tax to which all wage-earners will have to contribute. Some hospitals, languishing for lack of funds, hope that the taxes will have the effect of placing them on a sound financial foundation.

The proposal to change the gauge of the Australian railways to a uniform one has been reported upon by a committee of the Government. The committee reports in favor of a gauge of four feet eight and a half inches throughout the Commonwealth.

Under the Compulsory Service Law one hundred and twenty-five thousand men and boys have registered for army training.

The strike among the harvest companies still continues. Messrs McKay, one of the biggest manufacturers, announces that he is going to establish a factory in England so as to be able to produce a sufficient supply of agricultural machinery to cope with orders received from the Argentine.

FIFTEEN DEAD AS A RESULT OF FIRE IN NEVADA SILVER MINE

TONOPAH, Nevada, Feb. 24—Fire has been raging for more than 24 hours in the Belmont Silver Mine, the largest in the country and from twelve to fifteen miners are believed to be dead. Rescuers were driven back when within two hundred feet of the fire while working through the Desert Queen shaft late last night and the management decided today that the mine would have to be sealed to confine the flames and smoke.

It is believed that several met death by being dropped from the cage which made an ascent through the smoke. Eight men were injured, being overcome by gas while working with a rescue party.

Early today the rescue party was within sixty feet of the seat of the fire. Three of the party were overcome by gas and taken to the hospital for treatment.

It is contended that there is no hope of finding the entombed men alive.

That the death list might go even higher than the first estimate was indicated by the report of one of the rescuers who declared that he had counted the bodies of twelve dead men in one of the shafts. Other members of rescue squads declared that they believed some of the men imprisoned at a depth of 1,100 feet were still alive. They based this assertion upon the belief that the men were protected from the flames by intervening walls and that they had broken the fresh air pipe running through that section of the mine and were thus able to keep breathing.

O'NEIL GETS THREE YEARS

SYDNEY, C. B., Feb. 24—Wm. O'Neil, the New Waterford postmaster, convicted of stealing from the mails, was given three years, the minimum sentence. His lawyer asked for suspended sentence and the crown prosecutor recommended that the lowest sentence be imposed. The judge said he regretted it was not in his power to grant the request of counsel for the accused, but would make the term of imprisonment as short as possible, which was three years. Otherwise he remarked he would have been glad to do so on account of the conduct of the prisoner who had assisted in every way the course of justice. The judge however thought it was a case in which the clemency of the crown might well be invoked, but that was in the hands of the minister of justice.
