Synopsis of Canadian North-West HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS.

ANY even numbered section of Dominion Lands in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta, excepting 8 and 20, not reserved, may be homesteaded by any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, in the eastern or quarter section of 10 acres more or less. Single lands to be made personally at the local land office for the district in which the land is situated. Parties must be made personally at the local land office for the district in which the land is situated. The homesteader is required to perform the conditions connected therewith under one of the following plans: (1) At least six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year for three years. (2) If the father for mother, if the father is deceased (1) of the homesteader resides upon a farm in the vicinity of the land entered for the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by such person residing with the father or mother. (3) If the settler has his permanent residence upon farming land owned by him in the vicinity of his homestead, the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by residence upon the said land. Six months' notice in writing should be given to the Commissioner of Dominion Lands. Orders of intention to apply for a grant. W. W. CORY, Deputy of the Minister of the Interior. N. He watched her narrowly day by day, all his longing for companionship in these hours of his helplessness carefully concealed beneath a cold exterior. "If any one speaks first, it'll be her," he told himself over and over. So day after day as his wife came silently into the room and went silently out Daniel lay feebly fingering the sheets with his left hand, striving to conjure up some scheme which might rid him of the troublesome Israelites who refused to be counted above the thirty-fourth. At last in desperation—he had been counting, counting all day long—he decided to take the matter into his own hands. P.E. Island Pharmaceutical Association Examinations

The Board of examiners of the P. E. Island Pharmaceutical Association will meet for the purpose of examining candidates offering for registration on July 30, 1906. Every candidate for examination shall satisfy the Council that he has served as assistant in a drug store for not less than four years and at least two of these years has been employed in the dispensing of prescriptions. Candidates must give notice to the Secretary-Registrar in writing, of their intention to present themselves for examination at least fifteen days before the date fixed for the examination. Such notice must be accompanied by examination fee of \$5.00, and by certificate of the satisfaction of the Council that the candidate possesses the qualifications above described. Any person entering his name and not presenting himself at the time and place fixed for the examinations shall forfeit his fee to the Association.
