

THE CONFERENCE AT ALGECIRAS

Harmony is at Last Established—The Irritating Question of Policing Morocco is Settled—Germany, and France Regard Plan as Satisfactory to All Concerned.

ALGECIRAS, March 31.—(Special)—The conference tonight registered complete accord on Moroccan reforms, and appointed a committee to draw up a formal protocol of agreement regarding the policing of Morocco.

Following Russian suggestion, France will police four ports, Spain two, and France and Spain together, two. The result is satisfactory both to France and Germany and restores international relations to the normal.

THE ABJURATION OATH SWORN BY

Princess Ena of Battenburg on Her Admission to the Roman Catholic Church.

LONDON, March 26.—(Special)—The following is a copy of the oath taken by the Princess Ena of Battenburg on her admission to the Catholic Church preparatory to her marriage to the King of Spain:

"I, recognizing as true the Catholic and apostolic faith, do hereby publicly anathematize every heresy, especially that which hitherto I have had the misfortune to belong to, I agree with the Holy Roman Catholic Church, and profess with mouth and heart my belief in the Apostolic See, and my adhesion to that faith which the Holy Roman Church, by evangelical and apostolic authority, delivers to be held. Swearing this by the sacred Homosian, or Trinity of the same substance, and by Holy Gospels of Christ, I do pronounce those worthy of eternal anathema who oppose this faith with their dogmas and their followers, and should I myself at any time presume to approve or proclaim anything contrary hereto, I will subject myself to the severity of the canon law. So help me God, and these His Holy Gospels."

WINNIPEG IN THROES OF AN EXCITING STRIKE

Situation is Becoming Alarming—City Under Military Control—Riot Act Read Twice—Cars Manned by Police and Special Constables—Strike Breakers Imported and the Strikers Greatly Incensed Thereby—Trouble is Feared.

WINNIPEG, April 1.—(Special)—Wild excitement prevails in Winnipeg. A sullen crowd is parading the streets to night in anticipation of trouble in connection with the street railway strike, now on for three days, during which there has been serious rioting.

The city is under martial law, the riot act having been read twice by the Mayor. The company are operating the cars on the principal streets, manned by police, special constables and strike breakers. Much indignation has been aroused by a report, which the company denies, that a hundred professional strike breakers have been imported from Chicago. Magistrate Micken was suspended by the Attorney General for swearing in fifty of these as strike breakers. The Federal Government will be asked to enforce the alien labor law.

EARL GREY WAS GUEST OF HONOR

At a Dinner at the Waldorf-Astoria in New York—Speeches Laud Canada.

NEW YORK, April 1.—(Special)—Earl Grey was the guest of honor at the Pilgrims dinner at the Waldorf-Astoria on Saturday night.

The principal speakers were Joseph Choate and Earl Grey who made eloquent speeches lauding Canada, sketching her progress, and hoping for a long continuance and for the improvement of the present friendly relations with the United States.

MOTOR CAR TO EXPLORE ARCTIC

COPENHAGEN, March 31.—The Budget Committee of the Folkething has endorsed the Government's proposal to appropriate \$30,000 for Mylius Erichsen's projected expedition to Northeast Greenland, whence he will attempt to reach the North Pole. The most interesting and adventurous part of Erichsen's scheme will be an attempt to cross the island ice, where Greenland is widest, by means of skis, dog sledges and an automobile.

The attempt will be made in the spring of 1908. Should Erichsen succeed his feat would eclipse Dr. Nansen's much more southerly crossing, and Lieut. Peary's expedition on the northern slopes, where he had the advantage of communication with the coast. Erichsen contemplates crossing the unknown ice dome 10,000 feet high. He has secured the exploring steamer Belgica, which has been renamed Denmark. He will sail from Copenhagen on July 1.

Woman at Three Rivers, Que. Acquitted in spite of the Judge's charge.

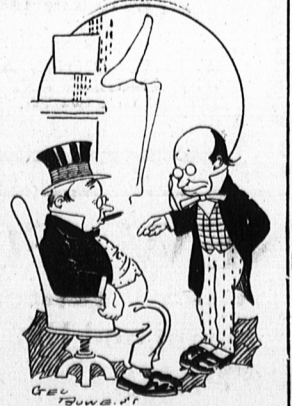

CRUISERS WILL BE PAID OFF

LONDON, March 31.—The armored cruisers Drake, Cornwall, and Cumberland will pay off in October, and as Rear-Admiral Prince Louis of Battenburg will then give up the command, the Second Cruiser Squadron as it now exists in a semi-independent form will cease. A cruiser squadron of six ships, with the Cochrane as flagship, will still be in being, but, like the First and Third Squadrons, it will remain with the Atlantic fleet, and will not make independent cruises as Prince Louis has done.

BATTLESHIP HAS SPEED 19.18 KNOTS

BOSTON, March 31.—The performance of the battleship New Jersey in maintaining a speed of 19.18 knots an hour in a four-hour endurance run off the New England coast, coupled with her remarkable spurt yesterday over a measured mile at Rockland, Me., at 19.48 knots an hour gait, places this product of the Fore River Shipbuilding Co. at the head of all American battleships as far as speed is concerned.

HUNDREDS OF SEALS ON THE ICE

MONCTON, March 30.—A passenger who crossed from Georgetown, P. E. I., says that the floating ice in the Straits is crowded with seals and many could be seen splashing in the water. The fine winter weather is the cause of so many healthy young seals being in the Straits at this season. It is said that during a severe winter many young seals perish or starve. The gentleman referred to says he must have seen over 100 seals; a great many of them were "baby" seals. The crew and passengers on the S. S. "Bruce" en route from Newfoundland to North Sydney last week succeeded in killing 34 large seals. The captain reports that during the entire trip seals were seen riding on the floating ice and playing in the water. The captain reports that he never knew of such a number of seals in that section before. It is a marvel he says.

IMMENSE NUMBER IMMIGRANTS ARRIVE

British Colonists, and Russian and German Jews—Record Number of Arrivals at St. John N. B. Three Thousand More to Arrive This Week—Mostly For West.

ST. JOHN, April 1.—(Special)—During the past twenty-four hours over three thousand immigrants have landed here mostly for the Canadian West. The Virginian and the C. P. R. boat, Montrose, arrived yesterday, bringing

thirteen hundred British colonists, and the C. P. R. steamer Mount Temple arrived today from Antwerp with nineteen hundred foreigners, mostly Russians and German Jews. Three thousand more will arrive this week.

BLUE JACKETS OFF FOR THE COAST

ST. JOHN, March 30.—The detachment of British bluejackets and marines that arrived by the Lake Manitoba left by the C. P. R. for Esquimaux (B. C.) to join H. M. S. Egeria. The detachment consisted of 117 officers and men, and all were brought around from Sand Point to the railway station in special cars. There were a commissary car, a couple of ordinary tourist cars for the men, and officers traveled in the sleeper. The bluejackets are seemingly blessed with good appetites. When the cars reached the station about 4 o'clock the sailors could be discerned at the windows engrossed in munching and drinking. The trip to the Pacific will occupy about a week. Quicker time may be made for there will be as little delay as possible.

He has been most distressed by the condition of our poorest poor and the sums which he distributes through priests and others are considerable. Mr. Croker is of the opinion that the United States are rather overcrowded, but that there is still room in Australia and in Canada for those who have definite calling of one sort or another and are prepared to do their best in it. He has lately been impressing the absolute importance of learning thoroughly a trade and advises everyone to stick to one thing as the only road to success. "If you do this," he says, "and put your heart into it, you can arrive at almost any position in the line you take up. Be content with your lot," he advises, "but always keep on striving for something better, and last but not least, don't wait for your friends to help you, but keep your chest out."

Mr. Croker goes on to emphasize the fact that no man succeeds who has not absolute confidence in himself. CONTINUATION OF COAL STRIKE

No Prospect of the Miners Resuming work—Foreign Miners Going Away.

PHILADELPHIA, April 1.—(Special)—While the operators announce that the miners will stand open for work on Monday it is doubtful if a single colliery will be in operation in the whole anthracite region. Even Oxford Mines which worked through the whole of the last strike will be idle. The men left the mines as usual on Saturday and there were no signs of any disturbance. Already the exodus of foreign miners has started. Meanwhile the price of coal is being steadily advanced. The indications are that the dispute in the bituminous regions will be settled without a strike.
