MR. and Mrs. Gane of this city received from Boston by steamer last evening in perfect preservation a number of white chrysanthemum blossoms of rare beauty. The variety was originally raised and perfected by the late Henry A. Gane of West Newton, Mass. and soon attracted the attention of florists in New England. They are grown under glass, the blossoms of pure white being five or six inches in diameter and formed with the petals intertwined so as to present a solid mass of bloom, which contrasts prettily with the dark green and beautifully formed foliage of the plant. The variety is named for the late Mr. Gane's daughter, Mrs. Jerome Jones, and has recently, for the eleventh year in succession taken first prize for best white chrysanthemums at the Boston Horticultural Exhibition. They are indeed rarely beautiful.

SHORTLY before eleven o'clock last night an alarm for a fire in Mr. W. A. Huestis' residence, Hillsboro Street, was rung in. When the firemen arrived they found they had to contend with quite a blaze and before many moments elapsed the fire had penetrated the roof. A number of streams were soon playing on the building and in a short time the destroying element was under control. The second and third story of the part of the building occupied by Mr. Huestis is badly gutted while the destruction to the furniture in the house where the fire started as well as that of the other occupants of the block, Messrs. L. Hassard and W. C. Turner, is very great, in fact nearly everything was drenched with water. The bedding, carpets, draperies, and all articles most susceptible to water were removed from the different houses and placed in front of the building under the protection of the police. The cause of the fire was a mystery up to the time of going to press this morning. Mr. and Mrs. Huestis were sitting by a fire when they heard the crackling and upon investigation were horrified to find their home on fire. Upon being informed Mr. Crabbe hastily sent in the alarm by telephone.

VICE ADMIRAL Sir Frederick Bedford, K. C. B. and staff and the officers of H. M. S. Crescent were dined by the members of the Halifax Club on Thursday evening. Sir Frederick was very happy in his reply to the toast to his health, and his speech was of a purely social nature. The Vice Admiral's remarks however, that so many naval officers had been captured in Halifax by the Halifax ladies—was received with cheers. Sir Frederick, Flag-Lieutenant Sheffield, Hon. Capt. Colville and the officers of the Crescent have all been exceedingly popular on this station and the Vice-Admiral's regret at leaving the station is shared by the citizens.—Halifax Chronicle.

A telephone message received in the city yesterday afternoon stated that the steamer which was off Dalvey, Tracadie, on Monday evening was riding at anchor a short distance from the shore and had not sailed on the previous evening as thought by those who sighted the steamer. It is now thought that the ship had encountered rough weather as she was minus her stack. Later on in the day the stack was placed in position and shortly after one o'clock in the afternoon the steamer weighed anchor and got under way steering out to sea. Those who saw the steamer yesterday state that she was a freight steamer possibly en route to Newfoundland.
