ENEMIES OF SOCIETY ARE IN CONTROL

Pope Pius XI Criticises Religious Conditions in Italy.

ROME, Dec. 21.—Hopes for a speedy settlement of the question between church and State in Italy were dealt a severe blow this morning, when Pope Pius XI in allocution before a secret consistory criticized religious conditions in Italy.

Although praising Premier Mussolini personally with much unusual warmth, the Pontiff in the course of a fifty minute address, in which he analyzed religious affairs in Mexico and France as well as Italy, condemned the conception of the state shown by certain Fascist elements.

"We declare pointedly," the Pope said, "that so far as religious interests, which are the supreme interest of the people, are concerned, in the faith in the force of right, in the vigor of laws, in the efficaciousness of the authorities is not yet complete or secure."

"It seems that an obscure menace, confirmed by clouds of suspicion, interference and difficulties—hovers over the activities of the Catholic action organization," which is the apple of our eye.

"We are hopeful and confident," the Pope concludes, "that it will soon be unnecessary to describe such conditions and conceive such fears and that with the removal of these things and the restoration of assurance and confidence among all honest people, complete, peaceful cooperation for the common good and prosperity may be achieved."

Several Millions For Immigration

(Canadian Press) TORONTO, Dec. 21.—A staffed special despatch from Ottawa appearing in the Globe this morning says: Legislation authorizing an expenditure of several million dollars annually to assist in the settlement of 10,000,000 acres of land on the three prairie provinces is under consideration by Hon. Robert Forke, Minister of Emigration and Colonization. Most of the land is within fifteen miles of the railway and is owned by the Crown.

The national executive of the Socialist party has rejected proposals to erect a monument to their dead leader and decided to open a radio broadcasting station—W.N.E.B.S.—in his honor it was announced today.

Found Farmer Was Hardest To Fool

NEW YORK, Dec. 21.—Harry Houdini, the famous escape artist, found farmers and several times the magicians' tricks nearly failed when he performed them face to face with rural audiences.

"In country parts, where men themselves perform the magic of making the soil bear harvest, I've found them less gullible," he wrote in an article published today by Farm and Fireside. "They know it's just a trick."

Houdini's first training in legions in the small towns, with travelling shows and later as a magician at county fairs. As an example Houdini told of an experience in an Iowa town, where he undertook to escape from a three-proof barn within an hour.

Famous Chef of Savoy Hotel Has Rebelled Against Orthodox Christmas Dinners

(Associated Press) LONDON, Dec. 21.—Francis Lantry, genial chef of the Savoy Hotel, master of the mixing spoon and baking oven, scholar and food artist, has rebelled against the orthodox Christmas dinners he has been designing for the past twenty years.

Offer's Historical Delicacies

"No meal in the world has had such a history as our Christmas dinner. Why not offer a meal, every dish of which used to be the favorite Christmas delicacy of great historical figures?"

"The soup has a history going back to the battlefield of Arroyo-le-duc, where Henry IV distinguished himself in 1559," he explained. "It was first made by King Henry's soldiers on the battlefield, and his instructions, simple, it is made from capon, fresh and is flavored with rice and tomatoes."

New Turkey Trimmings

Lantry's attention was called to the turkey which he had included on the menu. "Ah," said Lantry, "that, alas, is a concession to those conservatives who would insist on its presence. But it is made according to an old recipe originated in 1573 when Turkey became an English dish. In those days it was stuffed with sausage meat and bread crumbs and it is still the best way to serve turkey."

Expected to Contain Some Addition to the Order of Merit.

LONDON, Dec. 21.—The New Year's honor list is expected to contain some additions to the Order of Merit. This exclusive order, which was instituted by King Edward VII, is limited to twenty-four members, and at the present time there are no fewer than eleven vacancies. Admiral Sir Edward Seymour is the only surviving original member. Lloyd George is probably the only member who has received the honor purely on account of his political services, although the Earl of Balfour and Lord Haldane are included in the membership of the King's Music.

Says Waterfront Boy Is Lured By The Sea

NEW ORLEANS, Dec. 21.—Boys who watch ships go down to sea develop into men who go down to the sea in ships. Statistics on Quebec Tourist Trade

(Special to the Guardian) QUEBEC, Dec. 21.—American tourists spent the sum of \$57,939,350 in the province of Quebec during the past summer and fall, according to figures made public today, and compiled from statistics throughout the province. Of this amount the city of Quebec benefited to the extent of about \$5,793,926, while Montreal got about \$28,969,830. In all a total of 305,350 cars entered the province, of which 265,439 came direct through ports of entry of Quebec, remainder comprising tourists who came to Quebec via Ontario and the Maritime provinces.

Women Politicians Skittish

WASHINGTON, Dec. 21.—Politicians must be wary of women in politics, in the opinion of Mrs. Mabel Walker Willebrandt, Assistant Attorney General. "Women in politics are like skittish horses," Mrs. Willebrandt said. "You never can tell when they are going to buck or bolt and politicians can't be blamed too much for caution in hitching them to a political team."

Fifield Lost Decision on Foul

TORONTO, Dec. 21.—Norman Gene of Akron, Ohio, was awarded decision on a foul in the fifth round of the fight between Norman Gene and Canadian welterweight champion, at a local theatre here last night. The former weighed 155 1/2 and the latter 147. Fifield's title was not at stake.

Wine For Hens Boosts Egg Yield

PARIS, Dec. 21.—Wine as a stimulant to the egg-laying capacity of hens, is recommended by M. Joubert, professor of Agriculture at Fontainebleau, who has carried out experiments over a period of six months. M. Joubert found that six hens whose daily food was augmented by a small amount of wine produced 169 more eggs in the six months period than did six other hens of the same breed and age who lived on a strictly prohibition fare.

Gain In Customs Collections During November

OTTAWA, Dec. 21.—Customs collections showed a marked gain in the month of November over the same month last year. Last month \$13,600,000 was collected on dutiable imports while in November, 1925, \$11,700,000 was collected. Busy Day On Stock Exchange

(Special to the Guardian) TORONTO, Ont., Dec. 21.—Yesterday was the busiest day for many years on the Standard Stock and Mining Exchange. From opening time until close there was a wild scramble to buy or sell stocks, with the result that a record breaking business was done. With total sales reaching 1,493,550 shares, yesterday's sales topped the climax of several days' activities. Owing to the rise in price of Noranda shares the demand for Quebec stocks became increasingly heavy, with orders pouring in from all over the American continent.
