POSTMAN-SKIPPER PLANS TO RETIRE

VANCOUVER, Nov. 3 — (CP) "Cap'n Andy" has come a long way since the typhoon which hampered his sailing ship in the South Pacific 40 years ago — a distance which saw him become skipper of a small harbor ferry and one of the few sea-going postmasters in the world.

Capt. J.C. Anderson was 25, a young master mariner aboard a full-rigged sailing ship when the typhoon hit, carrying away the wheel.

He sprang aft and showed the Oriental crew how to rig an auxiliary wheel, but the gale had raged. A huge wave broke over the bow of the drifting ship, carrying the quartermaster overboard, against the rail.

On reaching port, doctors informed Andy that he must leave the sea and he came to Vancouver.

Five years later, fully recovered, he took command of the Seaside, 82-foot passenger and freight ship visiting points throughout the north arm of Burrard Inlet.

Now 65, he has been on the job 35 years and in addition to being skipper, sells stamps, collects mail, cancels stamps and delivers the letters at their destinations, provided those destinations are among the many summer resorts which line his route.

"I guess I'll soon be retiring," the veteran mariner says, "and I won't buy a small boat and cruise the world."

"If I ever decide to see again some of the ports I know in my sailing ship days, someone else will be at the wheel and someone else can do the worrying."

"Cap'n. Andy will be just another nosey passenger."

In 6 cases of deafness, and is not evident where the deafness is in the "hearing" nerve itself.

Just as the eye has a fluid which transmits the image of objects to the "seeing" nerve, so the ear has a fluid through which it transmits sounds to the "hearing" nerve.

When sound strikes the outer side of the drum of the ear, the drum vibrates or strikes three small bones in the middle ear, which in turn strike a window of the inner ear. This window—oval in shape—strikes against the fluid of the inner ear, then moves the membrane to which the hearing nerve is attached. The sound is carried by the nerve to the brain. In some individuals a small deposit of bone forms in the middle ear, which prevents the oval window from moving or vibrating. Therefore, it cannot move the sound onward through the fluid to the hearing nerve.

The window, or fenestration, operation is performed to provide another window in place of the bony deposit. The operation is performed by enlarging the ear canal, and boring a hole in the bone enclosing the inner ear in which is the fluid and nerve ending.

Sometimes the normal, or natural, window fails to vibrate because chronic catarrh affects the small bones and the catarrhal form of deafness, and deafness due to bony
