

MONTREAL, Feb. 2.—Despite a slightly easier tone in prices, prices remained firm on the Montreal produce and dairy market today.

Fresh graded cheese in cartons or less sold at 21 cents for extra, 19 cents for firsts and 18 cents a dozen for pullets. Unconfirmed sales were reported half a cent under these levels. Receipts were 90 cases.

No 1 grass butter in cartons or less was quoted at 20 1/2 to 20 3/4 cents a pound. Receipts were only 2 boxes.

Current receipts of Ontario cheese sold at 9 cents for white, and 10 cents for colored and 10 1/2 to 11 1/2 cents a pound for early make. Receipts were 312 boxes.

### QUEEN VICTORIA'S SHOES SOLD IN LONDON

The first pair of shoes which Queen Victoria wore were sold for \$50, at a private auction in London in aid of charity the other day.

"In America they would have realized a great deal more," a collector said.

The shoes are of white satin with a white kid sole and have as an embroidered "motif" a wild rose spray. They were worn by Queen Victoria when she was six months old.

They were bought by Mrs. Harry MacCalmont, one of the most-travelled women in England. Her house in Chelsea contains many of the curios she has collected during her five round-the-world tours.

Perhaps the weirdest of her treasures is a collection of fans decorated with Chinese figures. The faces are painted on finger-nails torn from the hands of white captives during the Boxer rising.

### Burned To Death At Wellington

Mr. James A. McNeill, an aged resident of Wellington, was burned to death on Wednesday night in a fire which razed his house to the ground.

When discovered by neighbours he was downstairs with both legs burned off and one arm. Life was extinct.

It appears that his wife had left shortly before six o'clock to take her grandson to her daughter's, Mrs. Stephen MacNeill, who lived about two miles away, and he identically tried to light the lamp and it is supposed that he upset it, and it set light to the house.

When neighbours discovered the fire the interior of the house was in flames and the roof burning. Nothing could be done to save the building. The old man was not discovered until 9.30. He was 78 years of age and had been attended by Dr. Delaney of Wellington for the past seven or eight years. He had been paralyzed on one side and although able to move about a little was badly crippled up. He was a life long resident of the district and had been a successful farmer. He retired from active farming and was living at the time of his tragic death about two hundred yards from the railway crossing. He was twice married, two sons and one daughter by the first marriage reside in the United States, his widow and one daughter, Mrs. Stephen Gaudet of Wellington are left to mourn. Much sympathy goes out to them in their terrible bereavement.

The coroner, Mr. Gaudet, held an investigation and decided an inquest was unnecessary. Constable Keys of the Mounted Police was present at the investigation. S.
