The rates are to range between \$100 and \$125 in first class and \$50 to \$60 in tourist. Meals will not be included in these charges, instead they may be paid for at a flat rate in advance or on a "pay-as-you-eat" plan.

Important financial and shipping interests are behind the move, it is said. The plan is to build two ships of 28,000 to 30,000 tons with a speed of 22 knots for operation in the spring of 1937. The service would at first be limited to the North Atlantic but later would be extended to the principal British Dominions.
