Co., No. 9 Field Ambulance, No. 12 Det. C. O. C., Nos. 20, 84, 107, and 148. Cadet Corps. At 10.40 a. m. the parade will march off in column of route in fours along Kent, Queen, Grafton, and Prince Streets to the First Methodist Church, where a memorial service will be held at 11.00 a. m. It is expected that all Officers N. C. Officers and men wearing the King's uniform will be present to do honor to the memory of our late Sovereign King Edward VII.

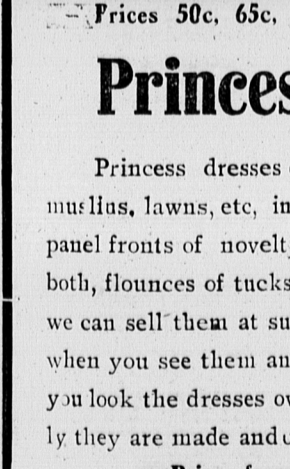
