Geo. Wood and Willard Thomas attended the Baptist Quarterly Meeting at Bedouque last week.

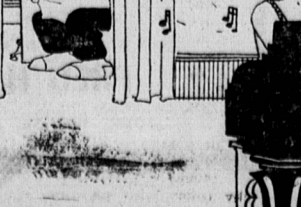
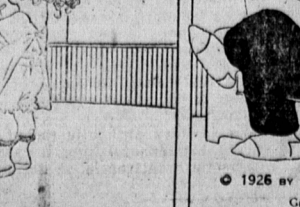
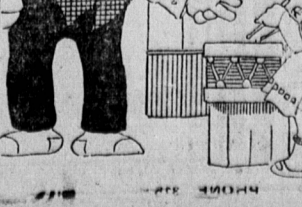
