IN MEMORIAM

MR. TOBIAS LANDRIGAN

On April 15th there passed away at his home in St. Mary's Road East, Tobias Landrigan. The deceased, who was born at Sturgeon was a life long resident of that place. Though in failing health for the past year Mr. Landrigan was able to be about as usual, until a week previous to his death. 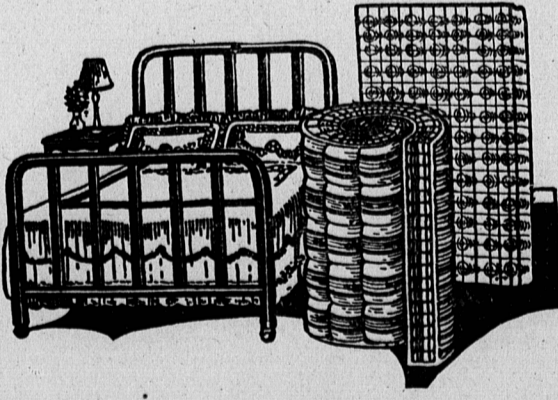
