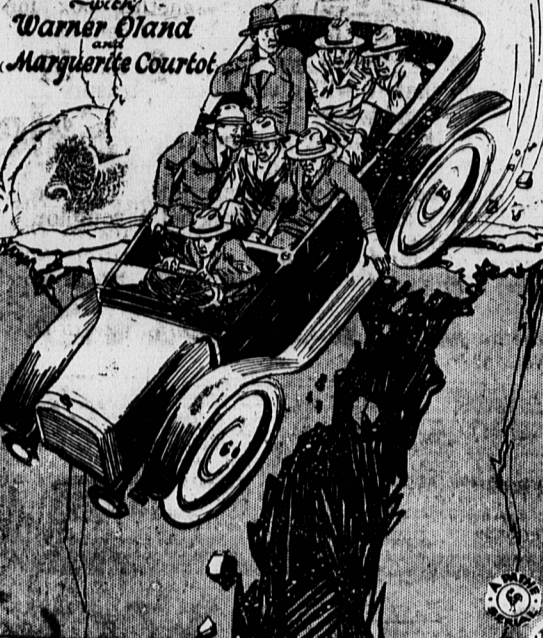

Damage Estimated At Millions of Dollars

(Special to The Guardian) LAKELAND, Fla., Oct. 26.—South Florida spent today in recapitulating the damage estimated to run well into millions of dollars caused by the gulf hurricane which yesterday tore across Florida's Peninsula. At times attaining a velocity of seventy miles an hour, the gale carried destruction in its wake but only in a few instances, according to late reports, causing loss of life. Of the cities and towns within a radius of forty miles of Lakeland, that could be reached by automobile today, Tampa appears to have suffered the greatest damage. Trees are down, houses with roofs torn away and foundations weakened by the tidal waves which swept in over the seawall from Tampa Bay have collapsed and logs and other debris swept in on the onrushing water's crest cover what were once beautiful lawns of the Hyde Park section, one of Tampa's most fashionable suburbs.

Sunset Beach, a popular resort of Tampa, was completely destroyed. Small houses were torn down and washed away and the white sands of the beach now show no vestige of ever having been inhabited. The damage in the city proper was for the most part confined to the unroofing of houses. A warehouse occupied by the Gulf and Southern Steamship Company, however, was destroyed as was part of the Mallory Line docks.

Gale Raged for 36 Hours.

FORT MYERS, Fla., Oct. 26.—The fiercest gale this section has known in several years raged here for 36 hours beginning at midnight Monday and attaining a maximum velocity of one hundred miles an hour. Transportation service was prostrated while the property loss for Lee County is expected to total well over a million and a half dollars. Reports from Sanabel and Captiva Islands said that water covered the entire island. Estero Island, near here, on which two beach resorts are located, was badly damaged, the cottages and other buildings being wrecked.

Local railroad officials said this city would be without transportation service for three days. The highways out of Fort Myers are almost impassable and many houses in Puntarassa were either badly damaged or washed away.

Entire Waterfront Wiped Out

JACKSONVILLE, Fla., Oct. 26.—The entire waterfront of St. Petersburg was wiped out by the gulf storm yesterday, the worst gale the city has ever experienced, according to the message received by the Times Light tonight.

The message which was sent by a resident of St. Petersburg, who went by automobile to Brooksville, said that Passagrille was also reported wiped out. "St. Petersburg," the message said, "is badly damaged and observations show that about ninety per cent citrus fruit gone. All previous storms no comparison. Town in total darkness for at least three days."

ET. JOHN, N. B., Oct. 27.—Hon. William Pugsley, Lieutenant Governor of New Brunswick has declined the Liberal nomination for the City and County of St. John. Mr. Pugsley has still two years of his term as Lieutenant Governor before him and prefers a sure thing to the uncertainty of an election.

Fierce Gale Sweeps Florida

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Unveiling of Soldiers' Monument at Belfast

The unveiling of the Soldiers' monument in the Belfast church grounds Wednesday afternoon was carried out with impressive and memorable ceremonies.

His Honor Lieut-Governor MacKinnon was chairman. The programme was as follows: Selection by the Choir—Ye Gates lift up your heads on high. Scripture Reading—2nd Chapter Isaiah—Rev. G. C. Taylor. Prayer—Rev. J. C. Martin. Selections by the Choir—O God our help in ages past.

Opening remarks—Lt. Governor MacKinnon. Selections by Choir—Fight the Good Fight. Address by the pastor, Rev. J. W. MacKenzie. Address—Rev. J. C. Martin. Solo—"I tell you they have not died."—Lieut. Williamson. Address—Mr. D. A. MacKinnon, K. C.

Rev. Mr. McKenzie expressed his regret that Rev. Freeman and Rev. Mr. MacDougall were unable to be present. They had both telephoned their regrets.

The above programme was carried out in the church, which was crowded to the doors. After the service was concluded the people gathered around the monument where the unveiling ceremonies were under the direction of Mr. Taylor, Lt. Col. C. J. Stewart on behalf of the erection committee formally handed over the monument to the trustees of the church. The monument was then unveiled by Mrs. Halliday and David Bishop after the names had been read off by Mr. Taylor.

The memorial which is a very handsome one stands within the church grounds. It is a fitting companion to the massive stone standing outside the grounds erected in memory of the Seiklik settlers. Both will serve to recall to future generations the courage and valor of the best type of Canadian manhood.

Belfast gave her best to the forces in the Great War and seventeen names on the memorial unveiled yesterday bear testimony to their sacrifice.

The speaker then took up the statements made by Mr. D. A. McKinnon re the Merchant Marine and freight rates and in a concise and business like manner contradicted the statements and gave the proof for every assertion he made. He said there should be some system of storage houses for potatoes, so as the farmers would not be compelled to put all their products on the market at one time, in the fall of the year.

In concluding he passed complimentary remarks on his colleagues Mr. Donald McKinnon stating every time he went out with him he became stronger in his convictions that he would make an admirable representative and promised the electors if they returned the Conservative candidates they would do everything in their power for better government.

As he was leaving the platform he was asked by Mr. T. Murray from the Hall "will you reduce the freight on muscel mud if we vote for you?" Mr. Myers, as his time was up, asked permission from the chairman to reply, which was granted. He then said he would use his best endeavors, and personally he thought the railways should haul muscel mud free, as the increased gross would make for the returns of freight.

Mr. Sinclair the next speaker thanked the people of Mt. Herbert for their support to him and his colleagues in the election of 1919. He went on to speak of the deficit and his reason for it. He went after the Board of Management and also to our own Island road, not forgetting to hand himself an occasional bouquet for his help to the Board of Trade and other delegates, while he was a member. He touched on the Merchant Marine and the extravagance in the construction and spent considerable time on freight rates. He wished to refer to the Roumanian loan, but time did not allow.

Mr. Donald McKinnon opened his remarks by replying to several attacks made by the Liberal candidates and in a most satisfactory manner, punctuated by bursts of applause, explained fully regarding government expenditures and produced figures to prove his statements. It was here there were several interruptions by Speaker Duffy and Mr. Sinclair, but Mr. McKinnon was not ruffled, and without hesitation, replied satisfactorily to the questions hurled at him. He then took up the matter of insurance on Railways over which such a fuss was made by the Liberal candidates, and proved beyond a shadow of doubt that the insurance placed was perfectly legitimate and a good business proposition. He stated the important issue is the Tariff—important to every man, woman and child. The Conservative tariff is a protection tariff, theirs is a revenue tariff. He dwelt at length upon this important issue and closed his remarks amid hearty applause.

Mr. D. A. McKinnon in a few remarks, moved a vote of thanks to the chairman, Mr. Kelly, which was seconded by Mr. Donald McKinnon.

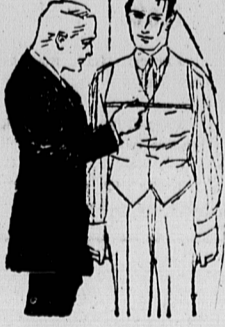
