SERUM FOR THE CURE OF PNEUMONIA

NEW YORK, January 8.—Health Commissioner Haven Emerson announced last night that the department would supply for the treatment of lobar pneumonia the serum treatment which has been perfected by the Rockefeller Institute of Medical Research. (This step, he said, might prove to be the means of lessening materially the death rate from pneumonia in New York city, which amounts to 10,000 lives a year.)

The health department now distributes antitoxin for the treatment of tetanus, diphtheria, and meningitis. The pneumonia serum will be made at the Health departments farm at Otisville, N. Y., where the other serums distributed in New York City by the department are made, as well as tetanus serum for the use of the army hospitals of Europe.

There are two general types of pneumonia—bronchial and lobar. Bronchial pneumonia attacks children and aged persons; lobar is the acute kind and is rapid in its action. The serum the Health department will make and distribute is for the treatment of type of lobar pneumonia, which constitutes about 60 per cent. of all cases.

VICIOUS ATTACK IN SING SING.  
OSSINING, N. Y., Jan. 8.—For a vicious attack upon Keeper Arthur Ferguson, in the prison storeroom, Joe Palmer, an inmate of Sing Sing, was put into solitary confinement following a trial before Warden William Moyer. Palmer who had been for bidden to enter the book-keeper's office, struck Ferguson on the jaw, cutting his face and breaking three teeth. Palmer will be drafted to another prison later.

Forty-two inmates left on a draft to Great Meadow Prison at Comstock to relieve the crowding at Sing Sing, which still has more than 1,500 inmates. Two more drafts, it is reported, will go to up-State prisons this week.

Warden Moyer has abolished the practice started under Osborne of letting convicts out one minute after 12 o'clock midnight on the day they are eligible for release. Instead convicts must now wait till after breakfast at 8 o'clock.
