Miller Scores But Canucks Lose To Toronto Leafs 2-1; Maroons Halt Red Wings

(C. P. by Guardian's Special Wire) TORONTO, Feb. 20—Winnipeg's Andy Blair, who has been starting on the defence but getting few goals this season, came through with a perfect bit of scoring to give Toronto Maple Leafs a 2-1 decision over Montreal Canadiens in a National Hockey League game here tonight.

The score had been tied for almost 30 minutes of play when the converted Leaf center swung along from his own defence in the opening period, stickhandling through all of the Canadian team and drove a hard shot past Wilf Cude. Blair's goal and another neat individual effort by Bill Miller Canadian defenceman, that tied the score in the second, featured a game that provided only spotty hockey. Neither team had the swerve Blair contributed. The win enabled Toronto to keep pace with Montreal Maroons, who defeated Detroit Red Wings. Leafs are two points back of the Stanley Cup champions.

Monroe Wins "White Hope" Tournament

TORONTO, Feb. 20—Canada's "white hope" of the heavyweights, 24-year-old, 180-pound Phil Munroe of Toronto, would no doubt get his ears knocked off in a pugilistic engagement with the dark menace, Joe Louis, but red-headed Phil holds the title today anyway.

He was the last of 31 aspirants for fistic glory to stand on his feet early this morning in Maple Leaf Gardens. A crowd of 17,000, one of the biggest in Canadian ring history to acclaim a winner, gave cash in addition to the "white hope" honors.

Munro knocked out Jack Slip of Winnipeg in the third round of the tournament final, and won \$500 cash in addition to the "white hope" honors.

In Serious Condition TORONTO, Feb. 20—Fred Matthews, 22-year-old giant from Armfield, Que., tonight remained in a serious condition, with the "outlook problematical," nearly 24 hours after he was knocked out in the Canadian "white hope" boxing tournament.

Dr. David Pratt, attending Matthews, whose real name is said to be Matuszyn, reported the boxer still in a coma, his paralyzed face indicating a deep brain injury. The injury was diagnosed as contusion of the brain, in addition to concussion. No fracture was revealed on X-ray plates, but there may be one at the base of the skull and the patient's co-operation would be necessary to locate it, said Dr. Pratt.

Indicating a slight improvement, the physician said Matthews was "more responsive to violent stimuli." Asked if the Quebec boy would live, Dr. Pratt said, "we're hopeful he'll pull through."

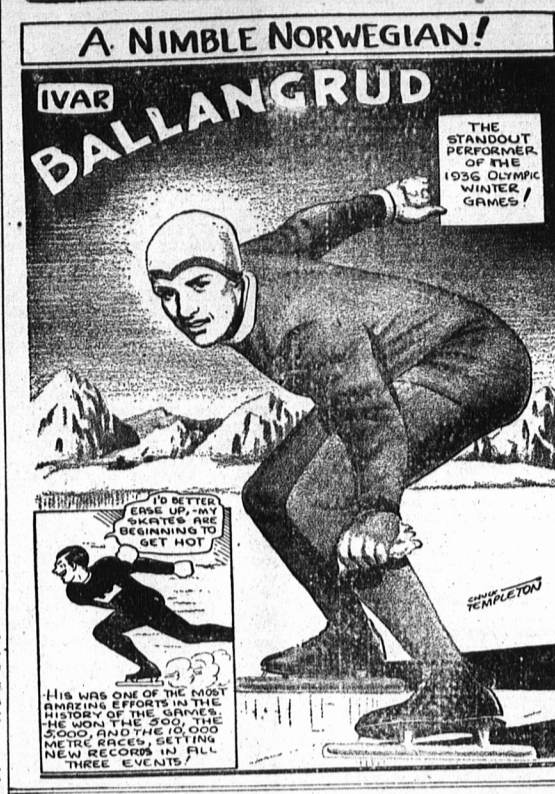
