Tokyo reports Big drive on Hong Kong

SINGAPORE, Dec. 14 (AP)—British and Australian air forces, red hot with smashing Japanese landing attempts on the east coast of Malaya were reported tonight hurriedly against Japanese tanks and armored cars in an attempt to stem the drive southward from Thailand on both sides of the Malay peninsula. A major battle apparently was shaping up along the jungle frontier. A terse British communique reported sharp fighting in Kedah Province of northwestern Malaya and in the Kalantan area of the northeast. "On both fronts," the war bulletin declared, "fighter aircraft are supporting our troops." (In London an authoritative source said Japanese troops also had struck across Thailand into southern British Burma near Pout Victoria. The BBC, quoting dispatches from the Malay front, said the frontier defence line is held by English, Scottish and Indian troops. (The broadcast said they hold positions north of Alor Star, less than 20 miles inside Malaya at the north-west, and that some of the fighting is taking place north of the frontier, in that territory. (The BBC emphasized the transfer of air units to the border defence and pointed out that earlier in the fight they had been many occupied in battering Japanese landing attempts. Singapore had another air raid alarm during the day but no bombing was reported. British fighters were said to have beaten off Japanese bombers which tried three times to continue last week's raids on the west coast part of Penang.

Soviet Envoy Says Japan 'Common enemy'

WASHINGTON, Dec. 14 (AP)—Maxim Litvinov, Soviet ambassador to the United States, declared Saturday that Japan is a "common enemy" belonging to "the same bunch of axis gangsters" but implied that for the moment the Soviet Union does not contemplate military operations in the far east. He said that Russia would have her hands full fighting the Nazi armies and that the Soviet army has no intention of "allowing Hitler to hibernate" before Moscow. "We should be rendering our allies and the common cause poor service did we for a moment relax our efforts in this direction just now," he said at his first press conference in the Soviet embassy where he took charge just a week ago. And, when asked whether Russia would permit allied forces to fight on Russian territory, or permit the United States to use air bases in Siberia for attacks against Japan, he replied: "That the Soviet Union "would welcome help on any front in the common cause." That he would make no answer in public concerning the question about the air bases.
