Tourist Route Cards To Be Compiled For this Province

The issuance of Tourist Route Cards covering all the principal auto routes in the Maritime Provinces and the Eastern United States have just been completed by the Connolly Advertising Agency of Moncton. The publications are well gotten up, each being prepared in folder card form of four pages and carrying valuable information for the tourist unacquainted with the route. They are a real guide containing as they do the points of interest to be seen on the route, say from Moncton to Truro or from Moncton to Saint John; hence, this there is to be found on the two centre pages the hotels, restaurants and service stations along the road and a detailed log of the highway, naming the places to be passed through and the mileage, also the bad curves, bridges to be crossed, railway crossings and such like, all of which is most valuable to the party making their first trip over the road.
 Mr. T. B. Connolly (Mgr.) and Leo J. Veniot (Secretary) of The Connolly Tourist and Advertising Agency are at the Victoria Hotel. These gentlemen, being tomorrow gathering data of P. E. I. for Route cards. They have just returned from Maine and Quebec and report an exceptionally big year for tourists and have received many inquiries from tourists re P. E. I. The roads from Borden they state are in good condition.
 The routes logged include all in Nova Scotia with the exception of Cape Breton, all in New Brunswick, and the principal highways in Quebec leading from the Provinces and the United States to the cities of Quebec and Montreal. Specific cards have also been issued for the routes between Maine and New Brunswick, including Calais to St. John, Augusta to Calais, Calais to Fredericton. In the territory from Montreal and Maine south in the States of New York, Vermont, New Hampshire, Massachusetts, and Rhode Island, the Connolly Advertising Agency are associated with the Adams Company in the issuance of the route cards.
 A feature of the publications is that they are free to all autoists who desire them, and are obtainable at the hotels, Chambers of Commerce, Boards of Trade, Tourists' Bureaux, restaurants, service stations, book and drug stores throughout the Provinces, and States mentioned. Another feature is that the color of the route cards corresponds with the post signs on the highways.
 The agency has been requested to prepare cards showing the routes between the mainland and Prince Edward Island, as well as on the Island and Messrs. Connolly and Veniot leave early next week to prepare same.

B. A. Bourgeois Receives Letter from Dr. A. S. Lamb

MONCTON, July 12.—B. A. Bourgeois, New Brunswick representative of the Olympic, has received a letter from Dr. A. S. Lamb, secretary of the A.A.U. of C., Montreal, in connection with the holding of the Dominion Track and Field championships at Toronto on August 20 and also in regard to the various provincial meets for the Olympic trials. The letter states that a correction has been made in the dates of the championships and also in regard to the sectional standards.
 The Canadian Olympic Committee at its meeting on June 4, summarized the progress that has been made in connection with these meets as follows: Each province will hold its own provincial meet. British Columbia, Saskatchewan and Alberta will hold a sectional meet at Edmonton on August 1. Manitoba will hold its own sectional meet.
 Mr. Bourgeois states that it has been practically decided to hold separate provincial meets in connection with the sectional trials in the Maritimes. No date or place has been set for this province although it will probably be either Saint John or Moncton. He will shortly announce a provincial committee to carry on the work.

Boxing and Wrestling Matches for Charlottetown

Mr. John Patterson, Champion wrestler, who is at present in the city has made arrangements for the staging of two boxing matches and a wrestling match in the Arena Rink on Friday evening July 27. The first match on the program will be a six round boxing match between two good local men, the second on the list will be the featherweight class, ten rounds, with Ferris of Halifax, pitted against another good man of this class from the sister Provinces. The big event of the night will be the wrestling match when the people of Charlottetown and P. E. Island will have an opportunity of seeing the Dominion champion, John Patterson in action against either the masked marvel of New York or Zolbrock, any one of which will make a tidy match for the champion.
 Wrestling used to be a popular sport in Charlottetown and the fans who followed it closely before will be pleased to learn that this sport is going to be revived.

 Lambs were from \$10.00 to \$13.00 and sheep from \$3.50 to \$5.50, calves remained steady at \$7.00 to \$10.25 for veals.
 The bulk of the hogs sold for \$9.90 and \$10.00 and watered sows \$6.00 to \$7.00.

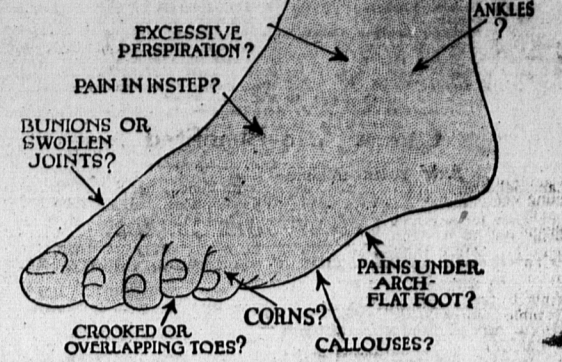

 OTTAWA, Ont., July 12.—Eggs—A rather easy tendency continues to feature Eastern Canada egg markets today, no changes are reported from other sections.
 TORONTO—Under full demand this market is inclined easier a sale of a shipment of Ontario eggs is reported at extras 34; firsts 32; seconds 27 delivered cases returned.
 MONTREAL—Dealers here are paying country shippers for ungraded eggs delivered cases returned extras 35; firsts 32; seconds 29.
 SASKATOON—There has been very little change recently in this market with dealers continuing to quote country shippers for ungraded eggs delivered cases returned, extras 26; firsts 24; seconds 19. Prices to retailers are extras 36; firsts 33; seconds 28.
 VANCOUVER—There has been no new development on this market since the weekend with dealers continuing to pay producers extras 28; firsts 26; pullet extras 23.

ST. JOHN—Dealers are paying

country shippers extras 33; firsts 29; seconds 23.
 MONTREAL, Que., July 12.—Produce—Some business was done in the local produce market here today in Manitoba wheat a few loads being entered for the United Kingdom. There was also some demand for ocean grain room for rye to Hamburg and Rotterdam, and engagements of several loads were made for July shipment at 9 cents per 100 lbs. the trade in the domestic market was limited. Millers today reduced values for spring wheat grades of flour 10 cents per bushel in sympathy with the weakness in Winnipeg, there was no change in prices for winter wheat grades. Small trades passing today in both shorts and middlings were strong in the millfeed market and prices were advanced \$1.00 a ton this was attributed to a general scarcity of supplies and the steady demand from both local and country buyers. The market in baled hay continued quiet. There was no actual exchange in the egg trade but lower grades were finding a good demand for small lots. Receipts showing a decrease over the corresponding day last week. Business in the butter trade was exceptionally quiet, little interest being manifested by either local or outside buyers. Prices however, are maintained. Some exports of cheese to England were engaged for yesterday at the recent rise in prices noted. The volume of business was not however large. The trade on spot is dull.
