Few of the Canadians who went to South Africa did so well as Sir Percy Girond, who not only gained a title but a permanent position as superintendent of railways with a salary of \$18,000 a year.

Ontario parties are so nearly equal in the new House, the majority being limited to a single member, that the Peterboro Examiner rises to remark that "Mr Whitney has had a one-derful escape from getting into office".

A cable despatch intimates that Canadian Ministers now in England may not return before September. They want to see the actual coronation, and they are being so heartily welcomed by the British people that their visit has been a remarkably pleasant one. To be a Canadian is a passport to British favor in these days.

About the most expensive railway in the world to travel on is the road from Skagway to White Horse on the way to Dawson City. The road is 111 miles long and the fare is \$29, or a little over 18 cents a mile. It takes 7 hours, 35 minutes to make the run.

A very pretty illustrated booklet comes to hand entitled Picturesque Victoria, which most attractively sets forth the beauties of British Columbia's capital city. On reading it we are moved to say with the Prince of Wales on his recent visit to the Pacific Coast, with a slight alteration "If we could not live in P. E. Island we could live in Victoria."

The Toronto Globe is authority for the statement that the tobacco crop on 15,000 acres in Essex County, Ont. produces \$2,600,000 worth of the weed. That is at the rate of \$133 per acre. Twenty acres in tobacco at this rate would yield \$2,660, which should be a very handsome return for the labor of planting, cultivating, curing and marketing the crop.

The Campanile of St. Marks, Venice, whose fall was noted in our despatches a few days ago, was a remarkable structure the foundations of which were laid a thousand years ago in the year 902. The tower was square, 42 feet on a side and 323 feet high. It was built of brick, and was not artistically beautiful. Its great height was its distinctive feature, being one half higher than Bunker Hill Monument.

The Congregationalist puts forward a plea for sacred music in the parks on Sundays. "The public park," it says, "is the peoples' garden and who can look without pleasure on men who rarely see their families together during the working days, with wife and children around them in the midst of growing things of nature on a summer afternoon, music, such as is appropriate in the home, adds to their happiness, and the public spirit that provides it is akin to His who had compassion on the multitude."

In a recent case under the Prohibition Act a witness, after failing to appear two or more times on the date appointed for the hearing, gave singular testimony when he finally appeared. He had gone to the place in question, asked for a flask of something, got it, paid for it and drank a part of it but did not know what it was! The witness referred to is said to be a member and deputy of a Templar's Lodge at Mount Albin. No wonder that the Magistrate commented with some severity upon this sort of testimony. There is too much shifting and evasion, not to say of something worse, in the evidence given in many of these liquor cases.

The Boston Herald, commenting upon Lord Strathcona's statement that in ten years more Canada ought to be able to completely supply the British market with wheat, dairy products and meats, goes on to-day:

There is the probability that within the next few years the amount of wheat grown in the Dominion of Canada will be greatly increased. The thousands of Americans who are now taking up farms in the Canadian provinces of the northwest are chiefly turning their attention to wheat growing, and if they succeed in their expectations, and can be provided with transportation to the seaboard at reasonable rates, it is not impossible that in the time stated by Lord Strathcona the exportable surplus of Canadian wheat will be as much as is needed by the people of England. . . . Canada is a great country when considered in the bulk, and we have in the last few years, discovered that much of her area which was considered as uninhabitable is land possessing wonderfully rich natural resources.

As to the number of Boers in the field during the war we are now learning facts that elicit surprise. Before the war a total of 50,000 was spoken of. But between the beginning of the war in 1899 and its end a few weeks ago the British had captured something over 50,000 fighting men. In September 1900 there were 2,000 surrendered to the Portuguese. Since the conclusion of the peace over 18,000 more have surrendered. These make a total of 70,000. If to these we add the number who were killed outright, and other thousands disabled and sent home but not captured we shall have 10,000 more at least, making a grand total of 80,000 fighting men. The fact is that the Boers armed and put in the field almost the entire male population from 15 to 75 years of age. And they could all ride and shoot.

This can hardly be true as yet, but may be taken as an assurance that it will be realized in the not distant future.
