#### THE CITIZENS' MEETING.

The citizens' meeting which convened yesterday in the Legislative Council Chamber at the call of the Premier was of far more than ordinary importance and significance. It was a representative gathering. There were present the pillars of our Island state—the Lieutenant Governor, the Judges of our Supreme and County Courts, the Premier and his colleagues of the Executive, the Mayor and members of the City Council, representatives of the churches, the bar, the medical profession, the press, and many of our leading citizens.

All these were assembled under the shadow of a great national sorrow, to take counsel together as to what forms of solemn observance on our part should signalise the demise of a Sovereign greatly beloved. That the occasion was an historic one was apparent from the fact that few if any, even of the eldest persons present could recall from memory any meeting summoned for a like object under similar mournful circumstances of a national character.

A most interesting feature was the reading by Judge Fitzgerald of a record which served to remind all present that by their meeting together and the resolutions they adopted they were making history. The record which he read told the story of a meeting very like that of yesterday, held sixty-three years ago in which the principal dignitaries of the Province and leading citizens of Charlottetown had taken counsel together as to what it was fitting for them to do at the death of King William IV. The reading was listened to with the closest and most interested attention. So at some time in the future—may the day be long distant!—another generation may turn up the records of yesterday's gathering for their guidance when again the shadow falls upon the Empire and there are craped sleeves and sorrow in hall and hamlet for a loved Sovereign departed.

It is fitting that at such a time we should send a message of condolence, that we should give outward and public token of the genuine sorrow which is felt by all; that we should suspend for a time our mirth and our employments and recognise in the removal of the Sovereign the hand of Him by Whom Kings reign. In doing this we but discharge a duty as loyal Christian subjects, and follow the worthy example of our forefathers. It was well that their action was officially recorded and the record so long preserved, and we rest assured that like care will be taken to keep alive the record of yesterday's meeting. A newspaper account, however full and accurate is too ephemeral for the purpose when the occasion is so unusual and of so much historic interest.

It seems certain that the new King will be known as Edward VII. Doubtless some persons would have preferred that he had chosen his first rather than his second name, the name by which he had been so long popularly known as a Prince. There is a peculiar fact also in regard to the English Kings who have borne the name of Edward. There have been nine already of that name. Edward the Elder, son of Alfred; Edward the Martyr, and Edward the Confessor all lived and reigned long before the days of the King known as Edward I. Of the six Edwards known to history by numbers the first three were of the House of Plantagenet, two were of the House of York and Edward VI was of the House of Tudor. His reign ended 348 years ago since which time until the present there has been no King Edward.

#### Supreme Court.

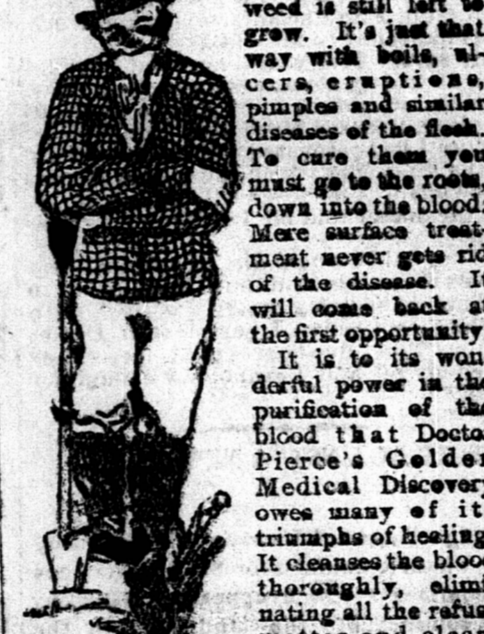
WEDNESDAY, JAN. 22.

The Court met to-day at noon. In the election petition of Martin vs. McKinnon, F. L. Haasard for respondent moved the Court for a summons to the petitioner to show cause why the order of the Court fixing Charlottetown as the place of trial should not be rescinded and a place fixed within the electoral district of East Queen's. This afternoon the motion was refused.
